## Is Latest Site for Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Mac. Proposed Airport

Lastest word out of Ottawa is that sites for the new international airport have been narrowed to four and all are north of Toronto.

The federal and Ontario governments are studying a plan to expropriate 5,000 acre 'cores" in each of the four areas selected as possible sites in order to prevent land prices from rising. A public debate on the merits of each site is expected before the

Government officials now say there will be a joint announcement from Transport Minister Don Jamieson and Premier John Robarts carly in the new year. They have set today as a deadline to find a suitable method of freezing development in the four areas which total approximately 320,000 acres.

The big jetport is scheduled to be in service in 1976. SLOW ANSWERS

M. P. Alf Hales of Wellington asked the transport minister if there were any alternatives to offer other than a new auxiliary airport for Toronto, during the question and answer period in the House of Commons. Mr. Jamieson replied he might offer Mr. Hales a "slow boat to China".

This prompted Mr. Hales to ask why the delay. "He has kept in suspense not only this House but all the people who are hanging on a limb as to where this airport should be" he charged. Mr. Jamieson apologized for being flippant.

Outside the House, the transport minister told reporters Ontario's new expropriation laws are making it difficult to protect proposed airport sites from speculators.

Although the four sites have been named as being north of Toronto, the government's desire to keep the locations secret until they make an announcement is well known. Local speculation does not rule out the possibility of the airport locating in either Nassagaweya or Esquesing, and the latest announcement a smoke screen.


