

Three Outdoor Rinks ... and Plan Two More • KID HOCKEY

Young and older skaters alike are cutting fancy figures, playing bush league shinies or just introducing untested ankles to the rigors of the ice skating at three large outdoor rinks created by Georgetown Recreation Committee this winter.

The rinks are at Harrison and George Kennedy public schools and at Cedarvale Community Centre.

"When the weather conditions are suitable we hope to add small additional rinks at the two schools which already have boarded-in surfaces," Recreation Director Doug Cul-

lison told The Herald, Monday.

UNBOARDED

The small rinks will be little more than large ice patches and unboarded to discourage the shiny buffs. Ideally the ice patches will be used by the pleasure skaters and "the up and down beginners."

Collison told The Herald he has had a few calls about pleasure skaters being bothered by puck chasers, but the outdoor rinks are there for the use of both and there is no way to regulate hockey and pleasure skating times

since the GRC doesn't have the people to enforce such rules.

DOESN'T WORK

Designating certain hours for pleasure skating and certain hours for hockey and relying on the public to adhere doesn't work either. It could happen for instance, that the ice is to be used for hockey on a Saturday, and only pleasure skaters turn up. If they proceed to skate anyway rather than let the empty rink go to waste, two hockey players could arrive five minutes later and ask that they vacate

the ice.

The two surfaces, one boarded and one unboarded should solve the problem at the two schools.

FLOODING

GRC has the co-operation of the Works Department in maintaining the rinks, however Standard Products has volunteered to take on the responsibility for the upkeep of the Cedarvale surface.

One neighbourhood rink, on Carol Street, has also been created by GRC, but this will be taken care of by volunteers from the neighborhood.
