### Merchants, Council Discuss Store Hours By-Law Change

A decision on store closing hours should be made by the end of the month, according to the results of a discussion between representatives of the Merchants Association and council members at a council committee meeting Monday night.

Dave Mackenzie and Charlie Crimes, of the Merchants' Association told council they had sent a questionnaire to all their members which they would then analyse. From this they planned to make recommendations to council, following a general meeting January 26.

Mackenzie pointed out that they were encouraging the merchants to state the maximum hours they felt should be in the by-law. "Everybody doesn't have to stay open" he added.

Reeve Ric Morrow contended the merchants should regulate their own hours, within a liberal by-law set up by council. He suggested the by-law allow every night opening until 10, except Saturdays then the merchants decide among themselves the particular hours and days.

"I'm fed up with being blamed for the stores not opening on Mondays" the Reeve said.

#### WORKED IT OUT

Cr. Harry Levy reminded council the gas station operators had worked it out themselves after the closing by-law was replaced. "Some stay open and some close," he added.

The Reeve emphasized he favoured having control to the extent no-one could open 24 hours a day, but repeated he wanted to put the pressure back on the merchants to regulate their hours.

"The merchants never mention that it was the merchants themselves who decided to close Mondays in the first place" he remarked. The reeve suggested council pass a by-law next week allowing the stores to open Mondays, then await recommendations from the Merchants' Association before making further changes.

#### RECOMMENDED FIRST

Cr. Ern Hyde felt it would be better to have the recommendations first, and change the by-law all at once.

"I can't see how two weeks delay is going to make much difference to the consumer," replied Dave Mackenzie.

Cr. Levy suggested council have a meeting with the execut-

ive of the Merchants' Association on the 28th, two days after the Merchants meeting, to hear the recommendations.

### Riviera French Chef, Businessmen's Lunches

### Four Injuries When Cars Collide, 4th Line

Four people were injured, January 15, at 4:15 p.m., when cars driven by Gary Poot, of Limehouse and Steven Lister, R. R. 4, Acton collided on the 4th line, above the 17th Sideroad.

Steven Lister, and Susan Collett of Georgetown a passenger in the Poot car, were admitted to Georgetown Hospital.

Lister had a lacerated left arm, and shoulder, and chest injuries, while Susan Collett had injuries to her head and abdomen, and a broken nose.

Stephanie Lister, R. R. 4, Acton, injured her left elbow and forehead but was not admitted to hospital. Gary Poot cut his ear, injured his hip and elbow, and sustained pelvic injuries.

The Poot car a 1967 Pontiac, was damaged on the front end, an estimated \$1,000, and the Mercedes Benz, owned by Lister received \$2,000 damage to the front end.

#### COMMITTEE SETUPS

Mayor Wm. R. Smith has made some minor changes in his committee set ups this year, but essentially they remain as formerly.

The import post of finance chairman, previously held by ex-Reeve Wm. F. Hunter goes to the town's new reeve Ric Morrow.

Roads, the portfolio held for the past few years by Mayor Smith, has been assigned to Cr. Harry Levy.

Mr. Levy's old post of administration and personnel goes to a new councillor Phil Siddall.

Another new member, Ernest Sykes, is in charge of sewage and sanitation which last year was held by ex-councillor Sandy Mackenzie.

Deputy Reeve Arthur Speight continues as fire and ambulance chairman.

And Cr. Donna Denison continues to chair recreation and parks, with trees and weed control added to her duties this year.

Cr. Ern Hyde again is in charge of town planning and development.

A new councillor, Mrs. Joan Smith has property, industry, street lighting and dog control under her jurisdiction.

### REV. HAROLD PATZER IS NEW LUTHERAN MINISTER

Rev. Harold Patzer began his new duties as pastor of the Immanuel Lutheran congregation when he was officially installed at a service in the church on Sunday.

Mr. Patzer, who comes here from Moncton, succeeds Rev. John Kiffner, the church's first minister. Mr. Kiffner went to Our Saviour Church in Ottawa late last fall.

Mr. Patzer, born in Winnipeg, is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Patzer, of Windsor, where he received his grade school and high school education. He was employed for six years in the purchasing department of the Ford Motor Co. there, while taking evening courses in mechanical engineering at the Detroit Institute of Technology.

In 1955 he enrolled at Concordia Theological Seminary in Springfield, Illinois and vicared

at Redeemer Lutheran Church in Waterloo. Graduating in 1960 he served a 3 point parish in Saskatchewan at Nipawin, Choceland and Snowden. Since 1964, he has served in the Logan-Monkton parish in the Stratford area.

In 1961 he married Barbara Rose Scheuerman of Windsor. She is a graduate of Grace Hospital School of Nursing in Windsor.

With their children Mark 8, Paul 5½, Jane 2½, and David 14 months, they are living at 11 Delrex Blvd. S.

After several years with the Ford Motor Company, he joined Canada Brick in Streetsville where he is vice president in charge of manufacturing.

Commenting on his political views, Mr. Blake told The Herald "We must take a deep look at problems without resorting to the politics of extremes. I believe in the 70s we can bring about conciliation of points of view through participatory democracy."

He said it is wrong to present the electorate with a cut and

dried alternative between what Conservatives refer to as free enterprise and so-called socialism. Government he says should reconcile the multiplicity of interests and wills which exist within a free society. The politician must act as a catalyst on public opinion.

The Liberal nominating convention will be on March 2.
