27 Road Fatalities Halton's 1970 Toll

There were 27 persons killed on roads in Halton county during 1970, according to a survey of police departments throughout the area.

Only two major Halton communities — Milton and Georgetown — were fatally free.

The greatest number of Halton's 1970 road fatalities — 13 in 10 separate accidents were on roads patrolled by North Halton detachment of Ontario Provincial Police.

The North Halton OPP figures include one accident in which three men and a child were killed in a three vehicle crash

on Highway 401 on July 29.

They also include the death of one child struck by a car while riding a bicycle and one who was crossing a road pulling a toboggan.

As a result of the July 29 deaths, a special study was made of a section of Highway 401 near Campbellville side-road which had also been the site of several other fatal accidents.

A coroner's jury at an inquest into the multiple fatalities recommended the department of highways continue the study of the grades on that section of Highway 401.

Mobile Home Park Trailer Camp Differ

The war of words between Chinguacousy and Brampton politicians over the possible construction of a mobile home park on Highway 7, adjacent to McLaughlin Road North, boiled over again during Brampton planning board's first 1971 session Tuesday night.

According to Reeve Robert Williams of Chinguacousy, the concept of the mobile home park has been approved in principle by Chinguacousy planning board, and according to him "When all plans are approved by us, we will probably adopt the official plan amendment."

On the other side Brampton councillors have been vociferous in their objection to the establishment of the park on the town's northern border.
