Campgrounds Shelved Till Township Zoned

An application to Esqueping council by Dr. Bela Hegedus, owner of land near Highway 7 and the 6th Line, to build a campsite was again deferred until the zoning by-law and official plan is adopted in Esqueping.

Dr. Hegedus wants to build campgrounds on the land adjacent to the Cedar Springs Motel. This area was designated a commercial resort area, under a 1959 by-law.

The owner of the land contends that this designation covers most of his property, and wants the designation extended to cover the rest.

"If all your dimensions are covered in the by-law, you can proceed. If not, we don't intend to amend the by-law at this time," said the recve. He County Health Unit pointed out the public hearing on the holding by-law is February 11.

The proposed campgrounds would be one of the "Campgrounds of America" which are situated all across United States, Mexico and a few in Canada.

The problem of disposing of sludge from town disposal plants, in rural area was discussed at length at Esqueping council Monday night.

that dumping the sludge on farms is not offensive, when the material is completely digested in the disposal plant.

Trouble has arisen, he said, when the digesters were not working properly and the material is not completely processed.

He told council the OWRC operates the plant, where there has been trouble with the digester. He stated also that the disposal of sludge is regarded as a useful agricultural product, which is being controlled by the Air Management and Waste Management Branches of the government.

Mr. Powell emphasized that the sludge should be ploughed into the soil immediately.

Cr. Len Coxe commented that 7 or 8 months of the year this is impossible.

"In winter it can be covered with lime," replied Powell.

R. Powell of the Halton County Health Unit pointed out that dumping the sludge on farms is not offensive, when the material is completely digested in the disposal plant.

Powell admitted sludge from Burlington, Milton and Oakville was being dumped in the remoter parts of Esqueping.

Cr. Coxe said, "These plants are working alright, and the sludge is fully digested, but there is something wrong at Georgetown with the digester."

The Health Unit representative said the OWRC was trying to repair it. "After the repairs the sludge will be inoffensive," concluded Mr. Powell.
