Mr. Alcott said in a letter to The Herald, "after 35 years of active participation I am retiring from Minor Hockey in Ontario. I regret to announce that after many weeks of careful deliberation I have decided to abandon the idea of the Little NHL Hockey Hall of Fame."

He expressed his appreciation to the Georgetown Legion branch and hall of fame executive members and directors for their support.

"Georgetown can proudly claim to be the birthplace of Minor Hockey as we know it today. Little NHL has spread the fame of Georgetown throughout Canada."

The Little NHL Hall of Fame executive included honorary president Brian McFarlane, president Bob Goldham, 1st vice president Henry Hale, 2nd vice president William Peachey, secretary Herbert Robinson, treasurer Herbert Arnold, founder Gordon Alcott, and manager of publicity Ralph Hawes.

Directors were John T. Armstrong, Allan Beattie, James Callahan, Wheldon Emmerson, Gordon Gray, M. A. McFadden, Dr. Rev. Bob Rumball and Rev. Len Self.

Little NHL was started in Georgetown in 1936 and Mr. Alcott was honoured at the 30th anniversary dinner in Georgetown Memorial Arena in 1966.

Reeve Tom Hill came out strongly behind the Township works force. Monday night when Earl Bentley, a resident of the 10th Sideroad, termed the roads "the worst in four years" and the service to his area "the worst in the township."

Mr. Bentley claimed the roads in his area were still blocked at 4:30 in the afternoon last Saturday.

Cr. Len Cox, and Dick Howitt both told of driving around the township checking on the roads, and while admitting some were not too good, found none impassable. Cr. Howitt stated Bentley was being unreasonable to judge the township on the

day there were the worst drifting conditions of the year. "After all many of the major highways were blocked, including parts of Highways 27, 400 and 10."

Cr. Howitt stated he had come up the 4th Line past the Bentley house and got through "so did a car behind me" he added.

The Reeve returned to his defence of the works force, saying they are called out at all hours and work till the job is done. Deputy Reeve Russell Miller pointed out that 135 miles of road could not be all ploughed in two hours, and emphasized

The Reeve brought up another point about winter road conditions which he felt were a hazard. He said citizens were cleaning out their driveways and piling the snow up on top of or in front of the snow piled by the plough, making the snowbanks so high, and so firmly packed that the plough couldn't break them down. "The road gets narrower and narrower and becomes dangerous," he said.

The road superintendent also urged the ratepayers not to throw the snow out on the road for the plough to pick up. "It only means more gels thrown back in their own driveways by the plough and it defeats their purpose."

Reeve Ric Morrow asked that the proposal be referred to committee.

"We should meet with the owners to discuss their proposal and seek a solution fair to them and to nearby residents" he said.
