

Second Cedarvale Rink Reserved for Skaters

Hugh Graham, who operated the rodeo here last May, has been given permission of the Georgetown Recreation Commission to operate another this coming May.

Georgetown will host the Ontario Arena Managers Association annual meeting, February 17th.

The Georgetown Baseball Association which now embraces, house league ball, minor baseball, and intermediate baseball, is meeting in Cedarvale on the 2nd Tuesday of each month.

Interviews for the supervisor and the chief instructor's job for the Georgetown Community Swimming Pool were held January 31st.

Georgetown Recreation Committee has already begun to plan for the summer playground program, with hopes of an expanded program in 1971. First playground programs were held last summer.

The advantages and disadvantages of a recreation committee in a small town will be listed by a group of Humber Collegiate students when they conduct a study here later this month.

Councillor Philip Suddall, a new Georgetown Recreation Committee member, was welcomed at the last GRC meeting.

A second outside rink has been added at Cedarvale. It is right in the park area and is for the use of younger children who don't want to dodge hockey players. There are also two rinks at Harrison Public School and 2 at George Kennedy Public School, an attempt by the GRC to create rinks at Joseph Gibbons public school in Moore Park was nixed because of new grass seed there. Standard Products has offered to maintain the Cedarvale main rink.

GRC in co-operation with the board of education and Georgetown high school, has arranged for organized basketball for local grades seven, eight and nine students. Don Patterson of the GDS staff is running the schedule which starts February 6th.

Georgetown Raiders Hockey Club, given permission by the GRC to sell advertising space on a display board inside the Memorial Arena installed the board last week. This is a first here, although other hockey clubs have used this method of raising money for years. Local merchants have helped Raiders on their annual poster in the past, and are continuing to back the club through display board ads. GRC's stipulation is that it is for a one year period.

PARK EXPANDED TO 40 ACRES

These parcels of land, residential lots and heavily treed, river bank and escarpment slopes, will extend the Belfountain Conservation Area to a total of 40 acres.

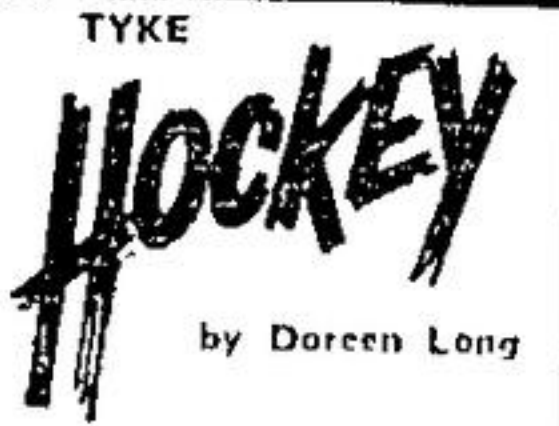
