BREATHALYZER BRINGS CHARGES TO THIRTY-NINE

Thirty-nine drivers were charged under sections of the Criminal Code of Canada after having breathalyzer tests at Georgetown Police Department during 1970 according to a press release issued this week.

The report said 67 drivers were interviewed by police after being suspected of impaired driving. Nineteen refused to submit to the breathalyzer.

Of the 48 tested eight, due to low blood-alcohol level, were not charged.

The release said that four persons were tested for offenses under the Liquor Control Act.

In spite of the inclement weather, 13 teams arrived from as far away as Orillia and Alliston to compete.

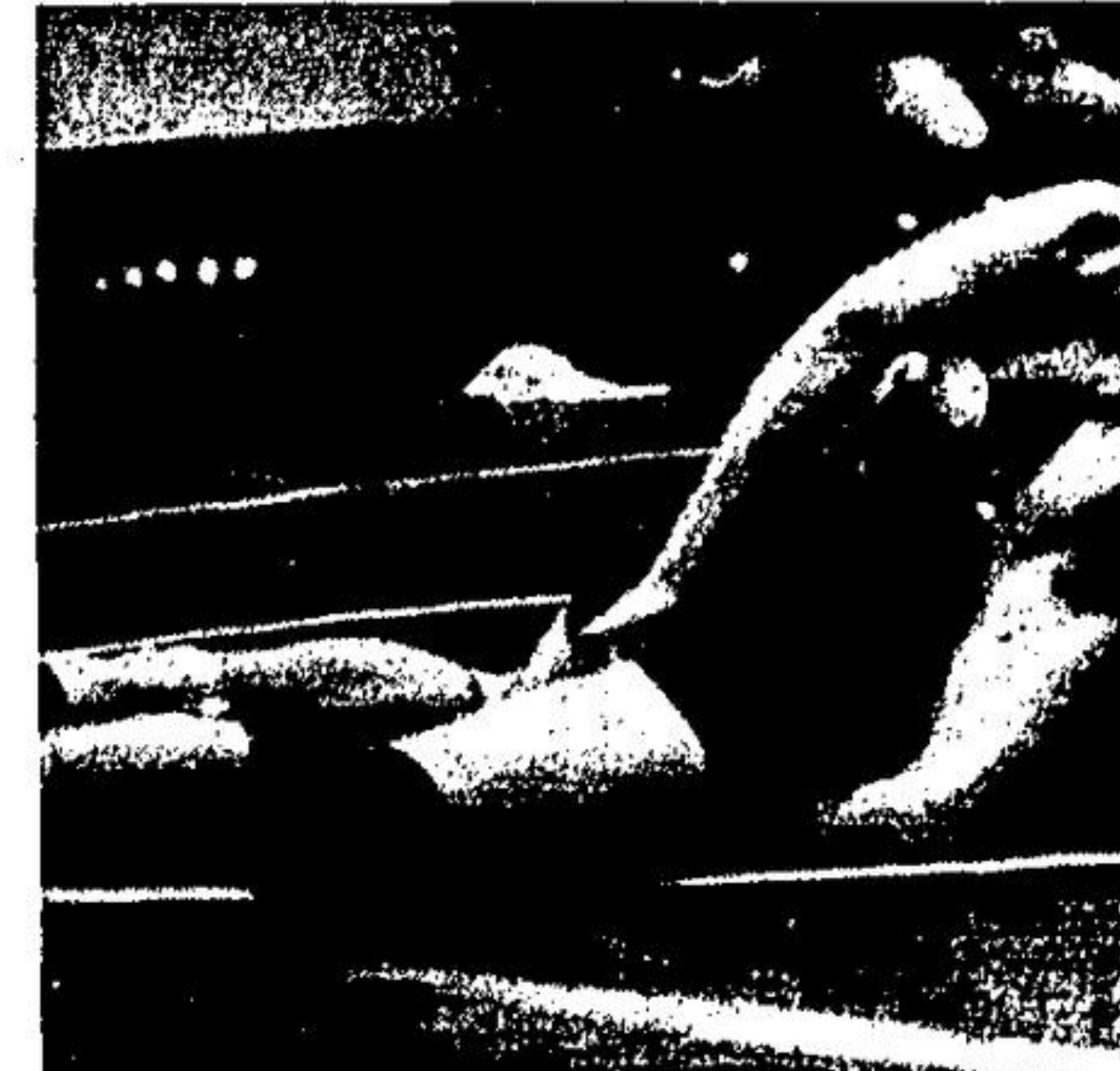
The tournament was a total effort on the part of students and teachers of the school, but co-conveners Dan Patterson and John Todd did the bulk of the preparation.
