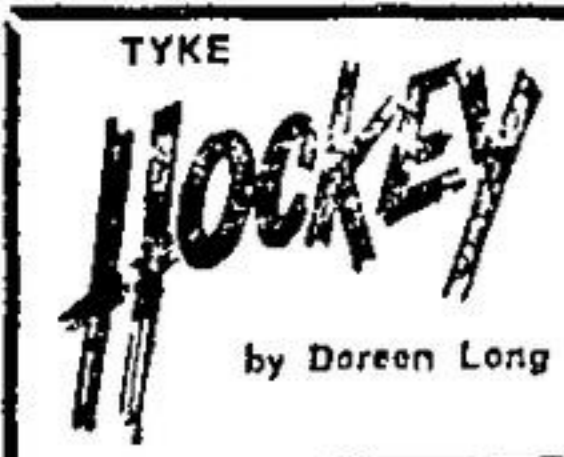


COLD FEET, THE SMELL OF EXHAUST FUMES AND A THRILL A MINUTE
