

8 Titles for GDHS Wrestlers At Banting Invitational Meet

Georgetown high school's men piled up 123 points and eight individual titles at Banting Memorial's Sixth Invitational wrestling tournament in Alliston, Saturday. And they did it against 16 of the best wrestling schools in the province including Ontario champion Winston Churchill, Sturgeon Falls, Kirkland Lake, John F. Ross and Thorold.

It was the best competition the Rebel team has encountered this year.

Winston Churchill collected 70 points to finish a distant second.

In a tournament of this size it is considered quite a feat if one school can collect two or three individual weight class championships, out of a possible 14. Georgetown's eight titles established some kind of record, and with a healthy Howie Ferguson in the 141 pound class it could have been nine.

Super rookie Mike Fobert, who had been having an outstanding year at 93 lb. got down to 90 lb. for this one and dominated all opposition in the 90 lb. class.

Perennial winner Tiger Joe Fobert added another championship to his endless list by taking the 115 lb. class handily.

Dave Hall had his best day of the year and outclassed all wrestlers in the 130 lb. class.

Undefeated captain Clive Llewellyn beat another Ontario champion in winning the 120 lb. class. This could be the year for Clive.

After two months off due to a shoulder injury Vince Graham returned to action on Saturday. He beat last year's Ontario champion and won the 140 lb. championship. Don Tust gets better every time out. He was at his best on Saturday and won the 168 lb. championship. Among Jon's competitors was last year's Ontario champion Dean of Churchill.

Sean Bilborough has been getting close lately to winning a big one. He did it at Banting. Sean's final match with Lafontaine of Sturgeon Falls who came second in Ontario last year was the highlight of the tournament. Sean won it in the last ten seconds of overtime with a super effort to capture the 178 lb. crown.
