

Propose County 4-H Groups Have a Coordinating Council

The annual meeting of the Halton 4-H club leaders will be held on Tuesday, January 26 at the Hornby Towers Golf & Country Club. Several interesting proposals came up at the annual meeting regarding creating more interest and actively involving more 4-H members in the organization. One of these proposals was to create a county council made up of representatives from the club leaders council and representatives from each of the 4-H clubs in the county. It is proposed that this group could meet several times during the year, firstly to plan the year's program and secondly to deal with any problems which might arise within a club or on a county basis. There is to be a change in the normal practice judging competitions held during the summer. This year the livestock

and seed judging competitions will be held in one full day with awards to be presented immediately after the competition. It is also proposed we have a barbecue to wind up the day and possibly some sports activities. Members will again be required to submit a special project similar to last year's. However, these projects will be held in the Agricultural office and put on display at Awards Night. It is hoped the Kiwanis Club will again sponsor prize money for this particular project of the 4-H program. The organization of the 1971 clubs will take on a different form this year. A letter will be sent to each 4-H club member in the county with a list of all projects available in the province and the members will be required to tick all projects which they would be interested in. Five Rural Smash-Ups During 'Slippery Friday'

Last Friday was a big day for accidents in the area, with icy conditions the factor in almost all cases. On the base line road and the 9th Line, a tractor trailer driven by John T. Wadley, R. R. 5, Milton, and a 1966 Volkswagen driven by Heinz Koesten collided at 7:23 a.m. The Volkswagen received \$700 damage and the tractor trailer only \$50. At almost the same time a tractor trailer, driven by David Watkins, R. R. 5, Milton struck a parked car owned by Bryan Broughton, R. R. 5, Milton, doing \$150 damage to the right front end. The car was parked on the 4th Line near the base line. Still on February 5, at 7:40 a.m., a car driven by Almuza Jennings, of Weston slid into the ditch on the 7th Line near Hornby, causing \$500 damage to the front end of his car. Later in the morning, at 11:15 a.m. No. 5 Sideroad and the 6th Line was the scene of an accident when a 1970 Chevy driven by Anne I. Goodfellow of R. R. 1, Norval collided with a 1968 Chevy, driven by William Brander of R. R. 1, Norval. \$400 damage was done to Goodfellow car, and \$200 to the Brander car. At 2:45 that same afternoon two trucks were in an accident

at 22 Sideroad and the 4th Line. The truck driven by Herbert Fisher R. R. 2, Acton was not damaged but the Steen's Dairy truck, driven by Ross Van Patten of Georgetown had \$150 damage done to the hood and front end. The 20 Sideroad, east of the 6th Line was the scene of an accident at 2:50 in the afternoon of February 7, when cars driven by James Watson of Glen Williams and Joan McCauley of Terra Cotta were in collision. Damage to the 1964 Pontiac driven by Watson amounted to \$600 and to the '71 Cougar, driven by Joan McCauley, also \$600. \$500 damage was the cost of an accident on Highway 7, east of Acton, February 9 at 11:50 a.m. \$350 damage was done to the 1970 Ford driven by Nigel Darva of Georgetown, and \$150 damage to car driven by Thomas McClure of Weston.

STUDENT CHARGED AFTER SHOOTING

A Georgetown youth was arrested at gunpoint late last Wednesday afternoon after firing four shotgun blasts on the high school grounds. One shot narrowly missed Georgetown police sergeant Frank Arthurs, and another shattered a glass door near where a high school teacher was standing.

Police said they were called to the school shortly after 5 o'clock by a caretaker who phoned saying a teenager was wandering through the building with a shotgun. When Sgt. Arthurs arrived at the school with Constables Charles Harrison and Paul Robertson, the youth ran from the school and started shooting as he retreated toward the wooded ravine between the back of the school grounds and Main Street.

The police did not return the fire. EXTRA AMMUNITION Sgt. Harrison circled around and made the arrest near Water Street. The youth was armed with a 20 gauge double-barrelled shotgun and had extra shotgun ammunition. The youth is a former Georgetown high school student, but dropped out last fall.
