"An excellent year" was reported for the club, which combines winter curling with an 18 hole golf course, with a substantial profit. It will go towards mortgage payments which come due this year.

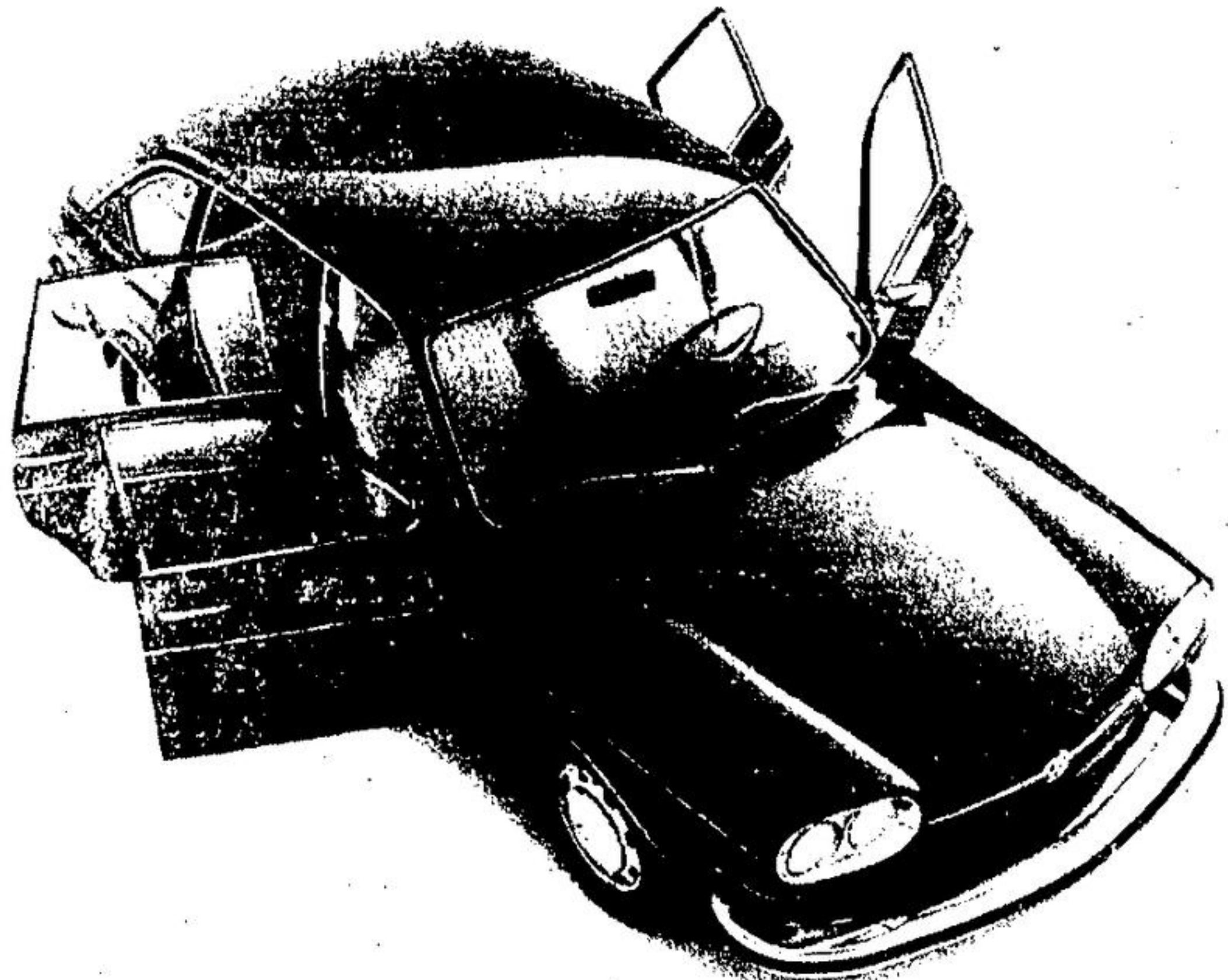
