Abstract nudes, done partly in pencil and partly by



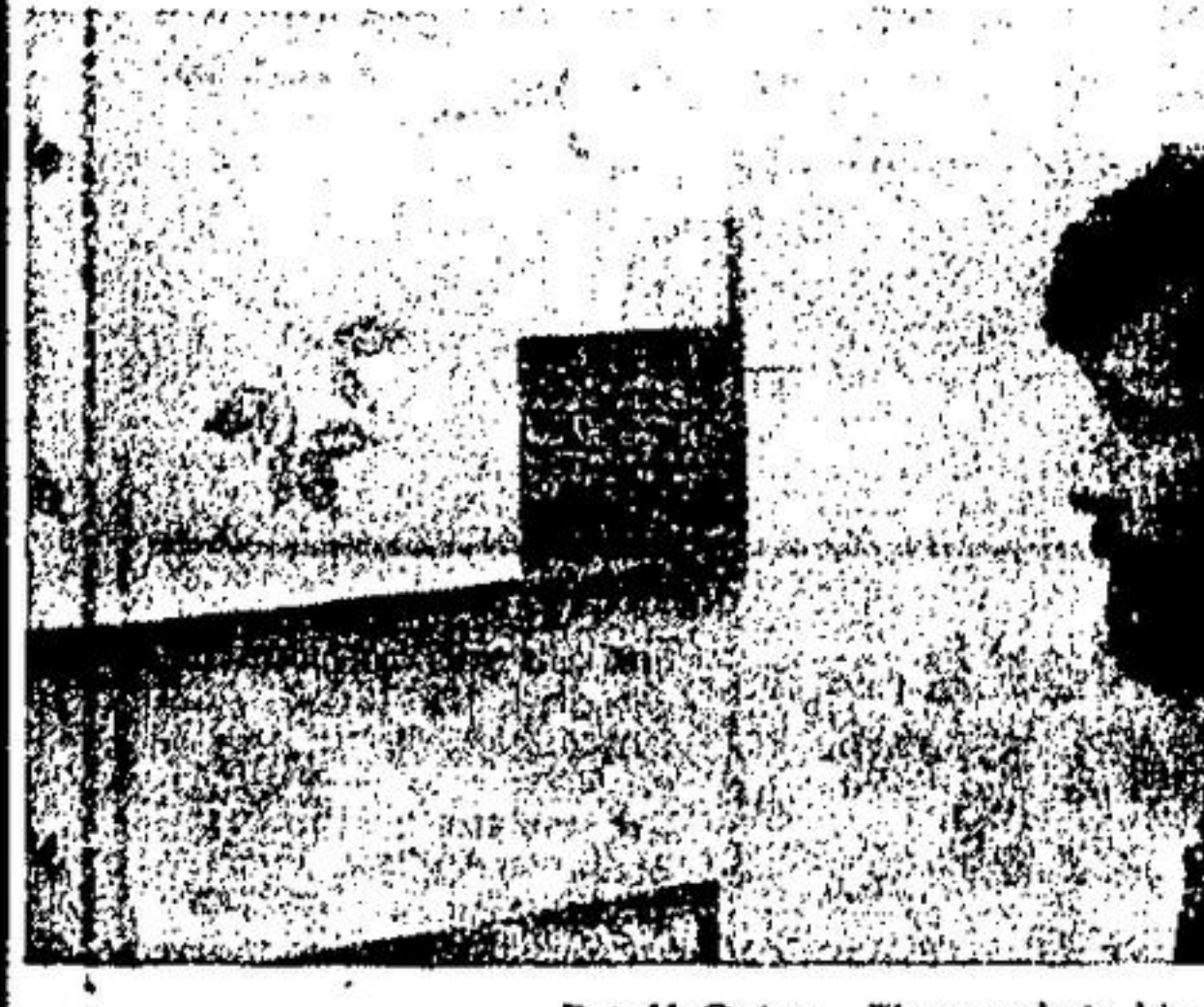

FAMILIAR FACES IN TV COMMERCIALS

"HEY! ISN'T THAT... OH YOU KNOW"

Three familiar faces appearing on television commercials have created a new parlour game, where watchers exclaim, "Isn't that, oh you know."

The three faces belong to Julian Reed, Bill McKeown, and Bill Sykes, and turn up regularly on the screen.

Julian at 35, the oldest of the threesome, has been in commercials for the past five years. In fact it is a family affair, with 15 month old Melanie, 7 year old Robin and his wife Deanna, all involved. Ten year old Christopher has done work in films.

Melanie is the baby Julian carries on his shoulders in the Workmen's Compensation ad.

CAN'T REMEMBER ALL

He guesses he has been in thirty-five commercials, but can't remember them all. He does recall a Natural Gas ad, a Bank of Commerce one on board ship, a Dreamship ad, and a Minute Breakfast ad, but best of all he remembers the first one he ever did in 1966 for Molson's. He has also done many "voice over" commercials, where he doesn't appear but only his voice is heard.

The latest commercials which haven't been shown yet are for Bank of Commerce and four for Shell Oil. The Shell Oil ad is scheduled for a March 29 kickoff.

LIVE THEATRE

He has also done live theatre including The Children's Theatre in Toronto and Vancouver, and the "King and I" in Kitchener, where he sang the lead role.

Until recently he had his own group known as "The General Store" in which Bill Sykes was also featured.

His desire to be a performer came from his first appearance as Scrooge in a Christmas Carol at Norval School.

Bill McKeown, 22 has been in the business for three years, and has done 17 commercials for television and countless number for radio.

He too, started with beer commercials, but with American beers, including one still running for a beer known as Colt 45. The Canadian beer commercial was for O'Keefe's Old

Vienna. Three for Michigan State Auto Insurance were filmed in Toronto for an advertising agency.

ON JIGGER

A current one for Chielets has Bill and a girl on a jigger travelling down railway tracks with a giant Chielet box in front. This one was filmed in Atlanta Georgia, during freezing cold weather, and the actors are lightly clothed.

The Love cosmetic ads on television have Bill's voice in the background.

Radio has been a big field for him, an advantage in this business where your face cannot be too much identified with one product. Fortina cigars, and believe it or not Wonderbra carry Bill's voice.

NEW VENTURE

He has just taken the plunge into a new venture. At the beginning of the year he formed a new group, a show group with soft rock music and variety acts. They are going into the Choo-Club in Guelph, The Talisman in the Beaver Valley and the Brown Derby in Toronto.

Bill is married to the singing star of the Tommy Hunter show, Debbie-Lori Kay.

RUNNING NOW

The Sykes face appears in two Molson Golden ads, in one Gulf Oil, with Wayne and Schuster, one for the 1971 Gremlin for American Motors, a Salsada Tea ad and a milk ad. Most of these are running right now.

Wool Stockings, Sewed Boots Not on Today's Prize Lists

A few of the items listed not seen on the prize lists of today, were best woollen stockings, best horse carriage, lumber wagon, iron plough, set of carriage harness, pair of men's sewed boots, farmer's all wool cloth and home-made cheese not less than 12 lbs.

It was of interest to note that the prizes for these items were from \$1.00 to \$3.00, as much or more than the prizes today but it was only 10c to get in to the fair.

Land Freeze Stalls Plans for Factory

B. Raeniski, lot 6, con. 6, who bought 50 acres in 1968 and had originally intended to build in 1969 has found himself caught in the holding by-law, which at the moment freezes, land in Esquering in its existing use.

In a letter to Esquering council, he said he would like to build a 2,000 sq. ft. light assembly plant, handling aluminium extrusions. He pointed out that in April 1969 he had been told there was no zoning and he could therefore do what he wanted.

He intended to separate five acres from the 50 acre parcel to build the plant, and perhaps later a private home.

Council will seek the opinion of the planning consultant.
