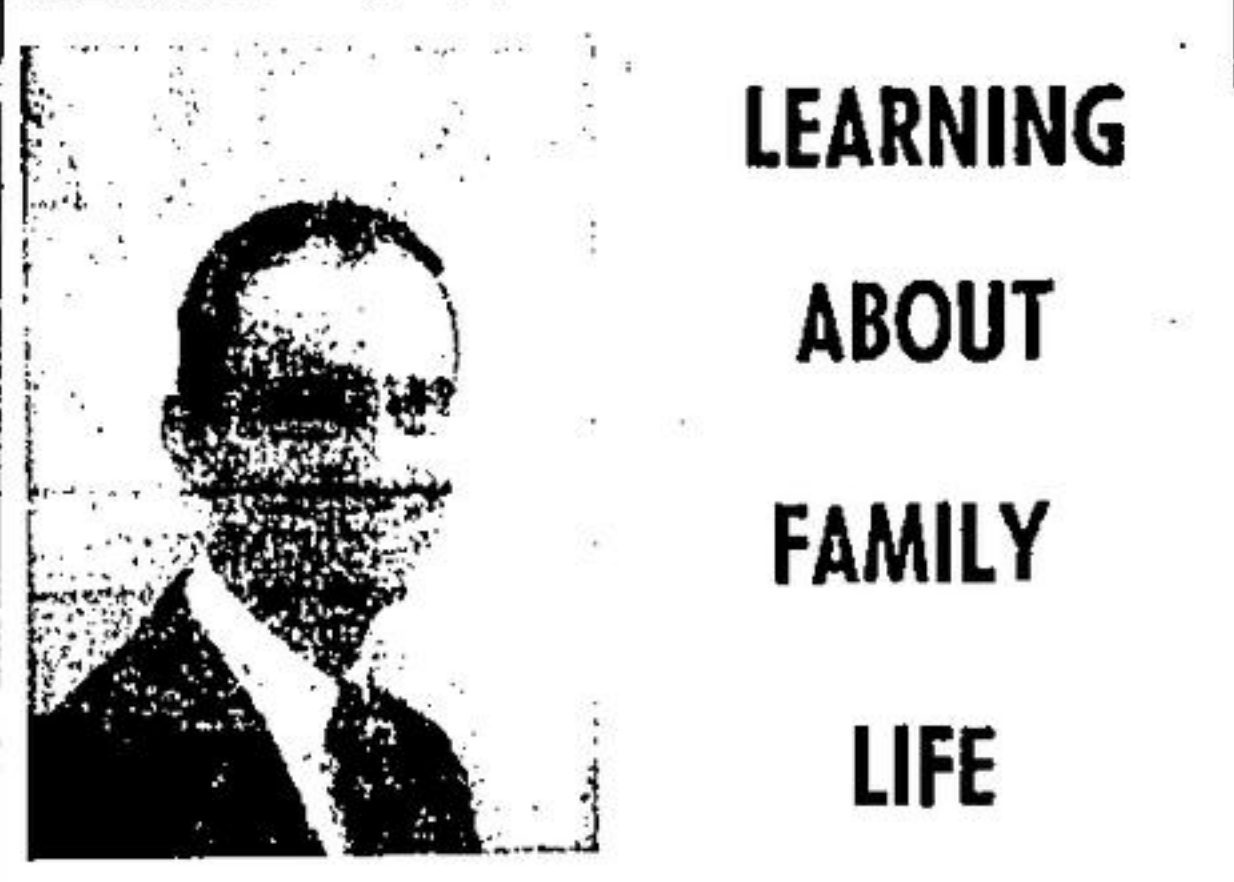

## CLERGY COMMENT

Mr. Wilson will be conducting a series about family values in the seventies, in Georgetown during March.

If a person who has serious marriage or family problems goes to a marriage or family counsellor, where do you go if you want to strengthen an already good marriage and family? The answer is a parent education program which will provide ideas, understanding, insights and creative problem solving to strengthen the normal family.

The idea of parent education is not new. Classes and workshops for parents have been held in various areas of the United States for many years. However the practice is still relatively recent in Canada. This is unfortunate when most of us live in a pressurized, complex, urban society. Parents complain that they do not have enough time with their children or that it is difficult to teach them principles of life when conflicting values are heard in so many other parts of the community. The job of raising children is made more frustrating by the fact that it seems to become a new "do it yourself project" with every addition to the family.

### REQUIRES TEAM WORK

However it can be very meaningful to come together on a few occasions to look at our marriage and family, and discover how one can improve its quality. Unfortunately, most such programs usually draw mostly mothers. Yet, today the demands of parenthood require a close team work approach. To say we do not have time for such an educational experience is like a man who was sawing a tree very labouriously. An acquaintance approached him and said - "You probably could do a lot better if you stopped to sharpen your saw." The first man without stopping said: "I can't, I do not have the time, I am too busy sawing this tree." As parents we get so involved in the business of living and child rearing that we do not pause to see how well we are doing and therefore neglect to "sharpen our saws" to become more effective parents. However the parent education series about family values in the seventies sponsored by the local ministerial association will give parents an opportunity to gain better insight and understanding to the demanding role of parenthood in our society.

### ATTITUDES AND VALUES

Because the family relationship is greatly affected by the marriage, the first session will look at how to enhance the husband-wife relationship.

The second will look at the importance of building a good self image in children and how this can become a good "insulation" against psychological and social problems. On the third evening the topic of discussion will be teaching wholesome attitudes and values to children and teens. The final meeting will show ways of strengthening and unifying the family as a whole.
