Locking The Barn

If the Ontario Department of Education had listened to the old saw about locking the barn after the horse is stolen, things might be a bit rosier today.

After several years of rushing ahead with inexpensive innovations and encourage ing teachers to think the public purse is a bottomless pit, the inevitable is here. School boards are being told to cut budgets, effect economies and stick to per pupil ceiling. And school boards, imbused with what seemed like no limit on spending, are antagonistic.

And well they should be, for it is doubly difficult to drop something once started, to toil teachers the golden age of guaranteed high yearly salary increases is ending.

We don't argue that change is necessary, but today the department of education has been a leader in the theory that change is good for its own sake, and that little of the past should be retained.

The financial pages of our daily newspapers make enlightening reading. Firms with luxury offices, computerized equipment, lavish expense accounts, report losses today when it was profits yesterday. Hardly encouraging to investors to buy their stock.


