Computer Bookkeeping Slated for County

Halton County will purchase a \$30,000 computer system to replace the present "antiquated bookkeeping."

County council last week authorized Warden Dr. F. G. Oakes to sign a purchase agreement with National Cash Register Company of Canada for an NCR-500 computer system, a central processing unit, magnetic ledger console and automatic reader.

Besides the \$30,000 the county will pay an annual maintenance charge of \$1,992 and a \$3,000 programming charge.

In effect, the computer will replace Margaret Maxted, former county treasurer who retired last year.

Burlington deputy reeve David Coons urged all municipalities in Halton to consider making use of the computer wherever possible.

"The only way we will get maximum benefit from this system is if we keep it running 24 hours a day," Coons said.

"We should think in terms of a Halton region so that the computer will be used to the maximum."

Argues Breathalyzer Against Bill of Rights

A young Georgetown lawyer will tackle a section of the breathalyzer law, arguing it is violating the Canadian Bill of Rights, and indicates his client will appeal a conviction Wednesday on a charge of refusing to take a breathalyzer test.

If the appeal is carried through it will be heard before the High Court Branch of the Supreme Court of Ontario.

William H. Manderson, in practice only two years, was acting as duty legal aid defence counsel when the case came before Judge William Sharpe.

A 25 year old Limehouse area man was charged with failing to take the test after an October 4 incident when he was found a sleep behind the wheel of his car in Georgetown.

Both Georgetown PCs Terry MacCarron and Arnold Vandevel testified he had refused their demand to take a test.

Manderson argued that Section 224 of the Canadian Criminal Code governing breathalyzers states it must be given as soon as possible without delay or a charge will be laid. The breathalyzer law says a police officer can make a demand for a test forthwith, he said.

DOES NOT COMPLY

Manderson pointed out one of the rights of a citizen under the Bill of Rights is the right to legal counsel without delay.

"I submit that if he does not comply with the demand forthwith, he is refusing to take the test," said Manderson.

"If a man is required to take the test forthwith, it is a denial of his right to have counsel without delay. This section of the code cannot stand and is of no effect," he concluded.

Judge Sharpe, finding his client guilty, told Manderson it had not been introduced into evidence the man had wanted the services of a lawyer.

ALREADY RESOLVED

"If he wanted one and was refused then I would not convict him," said the judge. "The Bill of Rights and breathalyzer laws have already been resolved by a higher court and the section is constitutional," he added.

Later, Manderson said he believed the breathalyzer laws are unconstitutional.

"In effect, policemen could have a machine in their car and could get a reading from a driver

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er in his own car and have enough evidence for a conviction in court.

"It's a little more than roadside justice," he commented.

READ CAUTION

He admitted to having given previous thought to testing this section of the code and was waiting for an opportunity such as that presented in this case.

Manderson said he agreed with the United States principle of having a police officer read a caution to an accused person before he is arrested. Included in this caution is a phrase which allows for a lawyer to be present while police are questioning him.
