Retain Grant, Many Benefits — Lorne Scots Plea to County

Halton County council last week heard a plea from commanding officer of the Lorne Scots Regiment to again supply their \$1,500 annual grant.

Lt. Col. Earl Lince of Georgetown told council withdrawal of the grant would "present hardships and curtail their activities to a great

Ever since council considered cutting off most grants to county groups and charitable organizations, delegations have urged the grants be kept in the new county

budget. POURS \$70,000 BACK

Lince, who also presented his annual report, told couneil the regiment, active as a militia reserve unit, pours some \$70,000 back into the county with wages paid to military personnel and those responsible for upkeep of county armories in Georgetown and Oakville.

"If there are any doubts in your minds, the only other money we receive comes from the department of national defence and Dufferin and Peel counties" Lince said.

ANNUAL GRANT

Members of the 105 year old regiment also come from two adjacent counties and it receives an annual grant of \$2,500 from Peel and \$400 from Dufferin.

Lince noted that the Lorne Scots employed 128 students during a summer militia program and plans have been approved to conduct the prog-

ram again this year. The regiment has retained its pipe and drum band.

Another band - the militarý band - was disassociated from the regiment last year. Nevertheless, most of its members are still active in the militia, Lince said.

HELD IN TRUST

He said the year's delay in handing back their government owned instruments is up and money donated by the counties last year has been held in trust to be used, in part, to buy new instruments for the bandsmen.

Accompanying Lince were Major lan Kirkwood, officer commanding 'A' Company, Oakville; Major Donald Egan, and Captain John Rodasvay, officer commanding 'C' Company in Georgetown.

The Lorne Scots request for their grant, as well as requests by various county agrigultural organizations, Canadian National Institute for the Blind, and others, will be considered by the full council which composes the 1971 budget committee.
