New territory was explored by Georgetown high school teachers last week. As part of Teacher Development Day, they toured Sheridan College.

For most of them it was their first visit to a community college since they have only been in operation for a few years.

Parents may view Teacher Development Day as "another day the kids are out of school," but the purpose is to give teachers an opportunity to widen their horizons. In turn they can then try to widen the students' horizons.

UP TO DATE

The broad range of courses offered at Sheridan, and the modern, up to date equipment available were a constant surprise to the touring group.

The more spectacular areas such as the huge photographic studio, for both stills, and movie making, captured their attention. Suspended lights which can be brought down from the ceiling at any time and various backdrops which are pulled in like stage curtains create almost any desired effect.

A process camera so big, part is in one room and part in another, had the visitors mentally comparing it to their instamatics.

ANIMATION

An original cartoon made by the students of the Visual Arts course, used many of the various courses offered in the animation class. In addition to the actual animation itself, background illustration, sound recording, animation photography, layout design and story creation, were necessary for the finished product.

However, as the teachers discovered, Sheridan does not offer only the glamorous sounding courses, where employment opportunities may be restricted.

They cover business courses, of

all kinds including computer technology, marketing, finance, and the insurance business.

POPULAR

Engineering technology is offered in its various phases, and heavy equipment operation is now becoming a popular course. Hotel and restaurant administration social services, community planning and municipal administration are courses offered at the community colleges, which were unavailable to students even a few years ago, when many of the visiting teachers were themselves in school.

The journalism course is not taught only by theory. The students produce a paper, each week, printed, photographed and written right there, and above all must meet the deadline. Bill Doole, former publisher of the Brampton Times, is the guiding hand behind this project.

If the theory of development day is carried out, the teachers will now explain the opportunities at Sheridan and guide those suited for the various courses in that direction.

URGENCY

At a luncheon later in the day at the Riviera, Stan Norton, Superintendent Educational Services and Staff Resources, of the Applied Arts & Technology Branch Dept. of Education contrasted the casual years of the fifties with the hectic years of the sixties, which, he claimed were spurred by the space race. He felt the urgency had been reflected in changes in education.

He maintained that demands of a changing society had to be met through deliberate alterations of the educational structure. He suggested the community colleges are trying to meet this situation.

The teachers' Development day was organized by Iton Nelson and Donna Metcalfe.
