

Freezing Rain Made Driving a Nightmare

Night mare driving conditions upped the total number of collisions on Georgetown streets this week.

Glare ice at the corner of Buck and Alley streets on the edge of the downtown parking lot brought grief to a Steen Dairy van, Saturday morning.

At 11.45 a.m. it slid out of control across the intersection into a fence around the Hydro Commission property. The truck, driven by John Horton of Erin was undamaged, but damage to the fence totalled \$250.

Fifteen minutes later a car driven by Leonard Walker of R. R. 1, met the same fate, slipping on the ice into the van. This time \$25 damage was done to the truck and \$250 to the 1965 Pontiac.

Klaas Vandermeer of R.R. 5, Georgetown and Roger Cooper of 29 Heather Court were the drivers of a 1966 Pontiac and a 1968 Mercury involved in a collision at the corner of Guelph and Sinclair early Thursday morning. Two hundred dollars damage was done to each car.

The same morning, a 1965 Chevy II driven by James E. Nicholson of 33 Edward Street, and a 1964 Valiant driven by John Cowbrough of R. R. 7, Guelph, came together on the Georgetown Market lot doing a total of \$250 damage.

Wednesday night, an accident at the corner of Rexway Drive and Prince Charles Drive involved a 1970 Chev driven by John Harkin of 31 Moore Park Cres., and a 1966 Dodge taxi driven by Arthur John Rice of Terra Cotta. Damage was estimated at \$150 and \$450 respectively.

Main and Ewing was the scene of a two car accident Monday, February 15. Jean Michel of 104 Main Street North was in a 1961 Ford which received \$300 damage, and Stephen Curtis of 56 Moore Park Crescent was in a 1969 Ford which took \$500 damage.

\$42,000. Budget Adopted At Reformed Church Annual

A 1971 budget of slightly under \$42,000 was adopted when members of the Christian Reformed Church held their annual congregational meeting.

A serious attempt will be made to increase support for missions and evangelism and other general church work, with \$10,000 allotted to this. Last year, \$6,500 was spent for this.

The 1970 income of the church was almost \$40,000. A separate report was given by the deacons, which is the social service arm of the church. They gave \$1,000 to world relief work,

as well as support to several organizations and institutions for Christian mental health, care for deprived and under-privileged persons, as well as support to individuals and families, for a total expenditure of \$1,400.

Several young people of the congregation participated in the discussions. Proposals to discuss the order of worship were discussed. Suggestions to have members meet in small groups and to organize parent-teen discussions were also taken into consideration by the session.

A daring daylight robbery at Delrex Smoke Shop in the Georgetown Market plaza, Saturday, involved a haul estimated at \$2,000 cash.

The money, \$900 to \$1200 of it gas company receipts, was in a purse behind a counter at the rear of the store.

It was discovered missing when one of the proprietors, Mrs. Ruth Harris, went to take it home with her at 6 p.m.

The gas receipts included collections made for the United Gas Company over a period of about 30 days.

It was the second major robbery at the Delrex Smoke Shop in three years.

A large amount of cash and

post office money orders were stolen in a midnight break-in in which thieves made their entrance from the roof.

The suspects in that case were convicted and sentenced.
