Edward Tyers, 76 Was Dairyman And Realtor

A Georgetown businessman when he operated Tyers Milk Products and associated with the Wm. F. Hunter real estate firm for the past 16 years, Edward Benedict Tyers, 76, succumbed to a sudden heart attack at his home, 14 Margaret Street, on February 9.

Mr. Tyers operated his milk business on Main Street in the former radial station depot, selling out in 1948 to Riley Brethour. Mr. Brethour, now a Toronto realtor, later sold to Irwin Noble, who moved the business to Guelph Street. The dairy was later renovated for the Christian Reformed Church, then razed to make way for the Canada Trust building.

Mr. Tyers was born in Ellice Township, son of Joseph and Marisa Carroll Tyers and lived in Stratford and Dublin before coming to Georgetown. After selling his business he acquired some of the Cedarvale farm property, farmed there for a time, then subdivided part of the land for home building. Tyers Ave., Edward and Margaret Streets, were family names. He was employed for ten years as a salesman with the late Tom Hewson.

He served in 1940 and 1941 with the Canadian army.

He leaves his wife, Mary Edwards, whom he married in Stratford in 1921; five children, Mrs. Gordon Fricker (Margaret) of Englehart, Mrs. John Reinbird (Katharine), Lewiston, N.Y., Mrs. E. McNeilly (Geraldine), Phoenix, Arizona, John of Acton and Mrs. Dennis Handy (Pauline) of Ramore.

He also leaves a brother Paeton 'P. J.' Tyers, Stratford and two sisters. Sister M. Honrietta of St. Joseph's Community, London and Sister Margaret Anne, Holy Cross Order, South Bend, Indiana; 16 grandchildren and one great-grandchild. He was predeceased by a brother William of Ottawa, and three grandchildren.

Rev. Gerald Craig officiated at requiem mass in Holy Cross R. C. Church and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery. Mrs. Anna Burke was soloist at the service. Pallbearers were Douglas Tucker, Robert Benney, William Boyle, William Dwyer, Wm. F. Hunter and Lloyd Crichton.
