Agree Flood Map Part Of New Zoning By-law

A flood level plan will be included in Georgetown's new zoning by-law.

The plan has been under study since the town engaged an engineering firm to map flood lands three years ago. Cr. Ern Hyde told a committee meeting Thursday that because the flood line runs through some built-up properties, it has caused concern and didn't get too far with past councils.

"Now we must establish this now if we are to finalize our zoning by-law," he said.

WANT IT NOW

The Municipal Board will hold a hearing at which objections to this, or any other clauses in the by-law will be heard.

Cr. Phil Siddall was joined by Reeve Ric Morrow and Cr. Joan Smith in wanting the flood control legislation passed now.

They argued that unless this is done, there is no control over lands in the flood area.

Cr. Hyde said he can see no reason for having two OMB hearings when the flood legislation will be included in the zoning.

SLIGHT CHANCE

Deputy Reeve Speight said he is puzzled about a flood map which seems to include properties where there is slight chance of flooding. He said that in the Hurricane Hazel flood water rose only 2 1/2 feet in the centre of town and would have had to rise eight feet to affect some of the properties.

"There's not enough water north of town to give that flow," he said.

Cr. Hyde said that the proposed zoning by-law is being used as a guide when there are requests for building, and that incorporation of the flood regulations in this, gives the town protection.

"We'll ask the town solicitor if this is so," said Reeve Morrow, "and if he says no, I hope the committee will reconsider and pass flood control now."

Councilwomen Want Beauty Maintained, Hungry Hollow

Georgetown's Local Council of Women has unanimously approved a motion to write the town council urging their support for the work of Warren Wright in his efforts to preserve Hungry Hollow in its natural state.

The motion was made at the L.C.W. meeting Friday in the committee room of the Canada Trust Company building on Main Street at which Mrs. Bruce Harding, and Miss J. Hutt of the Concerned Citizens of Georgetown and Mrs. C. Hansen of the Georgetown Naturalists Club were guests.

Mrs. Harding and Mrs. John Grady, a member of both the Naturalists and the Local Council of Women, brought to the meeting the effort being made currently to preserve the natural beauty of Hungry Hollow by Mr. Wright.

BOTTLE DRIVE

Mrs. Clayton Dick presented the Canadian Association of Consumers' report. The first item was a request from CAC of Brampton asking for cooperation in their campaign for a bottle drive, a step in the fight against one pollutant.

A discussion took place as the involvement of the Local Council of Women in collecting bottles for delivery in Brampton and various suggestions were made.

METRIC HERE

Mrs. Dick, as Economics convenor, read from Consumer News an article on the advantages of the proposed change over to the metric system of weights and measures. The disadvantages of the present system were noted and the statement made that the consumer benefits would far outweigh the cost of conversion.

The Red Cross report was given by Mrs. Geraldine Walsh, and Mrs. Nieuwhof gave highlights from recent reports of the Safety League of Canada, mentioning among other items the danger in the new acrylic berets now on sale, the menace to the small child of handling too large a bicycle, and the evident dangers to the young cyclist of some of the features of bicycles. The report concluded with a description of the new automatic seat belt.

The annual I.O.D.E. report was read by Mrs. R. H. Jones. In the absence of the president, Mrs. A. Pritchard was in the chair for the meeting.

Millington Promises Beef Sales In South America

"This will revolutionize the Canadian beef business" said Les Millington, head of Rockwood International Livestock Ltd. on Saturday.

He was speaking to a group of guests invited to a preview, to inspect fifty head of beef, Shorthorns, Aberdeens, Angus and Charolais, which leave here Monday enroute to San Salvador and Costa Rica.

Mr. Millington said that in the seven years since his firm moved into dairy cattle exporting, it is the largest and best recognized exporter in North America and possibly in the world.

"And we're going to do the same for beef cattle," he promised. "Once we start there is no turning back."

AREA BREEDERS

The cattle have been sold to private breeders but will be on exhibit first in the Central America republics. Area breeders who contributed to the shipment include S. G. Bennett's Scotsdale Farms and Reford Gardhouse's Aberfeldy Farms for shorthorns; Bill Lawrence, Oakville and Walter Cummings, Bolton, charolais; and T. G. Smith, R. R. 7, Guelph, angus.

Bob Powell, employed with the firm as a beef specialist,

talked to the group on livestock marketing, while representative animals of the three breeds were paraded in the show ring.

GOOD FOR PRICES

He said that beef breeders have not been conscious of the importance of an export market and have tended to deal among themselves. He hopes with this initial shipment to influence Central and South America with the value of Canadian beef cattle. And this should have a good influence on prices, he said.

He said all breed associations should work together to assure that the market requirements can be fulfilled. And he noted that Rockwood, with its experience, has developed important markets of which cattlemen should be aware.

BEEF BUFFET

He introduced company officials Mr. Millington, his son Jim and son-in-law Emil Olivier.

To top off the day for those attending a roast beef buffet was served along with refreshments.

The cattle leave Georgetown by truck Monday for Florida on the first leg of their journey. From there shipment will continue by air freight.

Georgetown wrestlers captured eight firsts and three seconds and ran away with the team title. Closest schools to Georgetown's 128 points, were Perdue and Erindale each with 63. Others in the top 10 were White Oaks with 40 and M. M. Robinson with 25.

Other schools attending were Gordon Graydon, Glen Forests, Bramalea, Mayfield, Lorne Park, Applewood, Port

Credit, Central Peel, Westwood, Clarkson, Aldershot, Nelson, Burlington Central, and Oakville-Trafalgar.
