WELLAND WINS OPENER

Outplay Opponents, Raiders Drop First Game of Play-Offs

If Georgetown Raiders don't even their best of five playoff series with Welland here tomorrow night they'll be the most surprised team in the Niagara Peninsula Intermediate A circuit.

Raiders outplayed Welland in the lid lifter in Welland Sunday but surrendered a 7-4 decision to the team they had downed 6-4 in the last game of the schedule 48 hours earlier in Georgetown Memorial Arena.

Raiders deserved their 2-1 lead at the end of the first period Sunday, and should have had more than the 3-2 edge at the end of the second, but sagged in the third when Welland outscored them 5-1.

Actually the final period was not as lopsided as it appeared. Welland's third goal was of the soft variety, and goals six and seven went into an empty net in the 60th minute.

FAST START

Georgetown's first period production included goals two minutes apart. Steve Blundy, the Sheridan College star who makes a habit of leading off the scoring, converted Terry Holmes' relay from Blake Inglis into a 1-0 edge at 6:33. When Raider veteran Blake Inglis doubled it from Al Stitt and Don Currie it looked like Georgetown's night.

Brian Angelo lifted the Welland crowd off their hands at 15:46 scoring with aid from Fred Bassi and George Krupa. Mike Latniovich evened the score at 5:20 in the second frame, but Junior Tibbetts recaptured the slim lead for Georgetown at 10:53 from Neil Cotton.

Al Stitt's marker from Tibbetts regained the two goal bulge for Raiders at 2:24 of the third. But Welland started their stretch run less than a minute later when Fred Bassi cashed in with an easy goal.

REID HERO

Boots Beadant deadlocked it with the first of his pair half way through the period, and Bob Reid played the hero's roll by scoring the winner with three minutes left.

Sonny Desson and Beadant had no goal to beat with their shots into the gaping Raider cage at 19:19 and 19:50.

All of the game's 11 goals were scored with both teams at full strength since the penalty calls totalled two. Only Welland's Brian Angelo and Raiders' Blake Inglis visited the of-

Thirty-two pucks didn't enter the Georgetown net because of Brian Chapman's acrobatics. Errol McKibbin intercepted 32 at the other end.

SCHEDULE FINALE

Raiders rained 55 shots on Welland's alternate goalie Pete Jenkins and took 46 in return when they wrapped up the regular campaign here Friday.

In scoring, this one set the pattern for Sunday's meeting with Raiders opening a 4-0 gap in the first period and Welland whittling away at it in the second and third.

The visitors notched the only goal of the middle period, and outscored the locals 3-2 in the third. The teams were knotted 4-4 when Terry Holmes threaded an open corner with the winner at 8:30. Junior Tibbetts relieved some pressure with an insurance goal at 18:31.

PLAY FRIDAY

Blundy; Tibbetts from Don Norton and Al Stitt; Inglis from Stitt; and Stitt unassisted constructed the first period margin. Stitt and Tibbetts assisted on Holmes' winner, and Norton and Stitt on Tibbetts' late goal.

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OUTDOORS

TIE THEM THIS WAY
AND TROUT FOR SURE

In previous columns I mentioned some easy-to-tie trout flies made from simple materials that had proven very effective to fill one's creel.

RED BADGER

With a little knowledge of materials and previous experience with the other easier-to-tie flies one can very easily tie the red badger streamer.

A 3 x long or 4 x long shank hook, with a straight bend in limerick style I believe is best. The tail is made up of bright red hackle tips, two is best, ribbing is of medium silver flat tinsel, and the body is bright red seal fur spun on a section of thread that has been treated with sticky liquid so the seal fur will stick when spun around the thread.

Four matched badger hackles are selected and tied on to form a wing in sort of peak-roof style. The wings should extend out to the end of the tail. The cheek or shoulder dressing consists of a medium sized jungle, cockeyed feather. The hackle tied collar style is from a Plymouth Rock hen, — when a fly tyer has mastered this one it gives him a feeling that he has created something more complicated. The finished streamer is not only beautiful to look at, but when fished to imitate a minnow, or insects, will take many trout for the pan.

JACK WAS A MASTER

The late Jack Sutton of Toronto was a master at the art of fly tying and the red badger was one of his favourites. Jack Sutton fished Eugenia waters for many years. To quote him on just how to use the red badger fly the answer was — "strip it in so fast from deep water in such a manner that you are trying to keep the trout from catching up to it." That's when it was the most effective. That was Jack's theory and it worked.

Above the fill-way at the top end of Eugenia Lake, is a pool surrounded by logs. It is named after Canada's noted fly tyer Sutton's Pool. Over the years thousands of speckled trout were taken from this spot.

Artificial Eugenia Lake was created approximately 50 years ago by the Ontario Hydro dam at Eugenia. It is fed by the Beaver River which has its source at Faversham. The mouth of the Beaver is at Thornbury and is famous for its spring and fall run of rainbow. Four years after Eugenia Lake was formed, it produced big trout, due to the rich food that came from the water. Jack Sutton was one of the first to fish these waters. More about Eugenia Lake some other time.

THE WISH IS THE FATHER OF THE THOUGHT

In my mind, I can picture an early spring, the crows are back, robins have been seen and Mrs. Lyle Armstrong of R. 1, Georgetown, has seen roundbills running back and forth on the sunny side hills as they are facing the south.

Our small cedars on our lawn not long ago had snow and ice on their tops, which made them bend over, and as

one person said "they look as if they are praying for spring to come." Now they are erect and just waiting for the warmth that will start the sap flowing in their small trunks and make them once again greener and taller.

Like most people who like the outdoors the smell from cedars is a welcome odour, the little cedars were dug up and brought here from Eugenia which has more than their fair share of this evergreen.

That's all I have time for so until next time . . . "Tight Lines, Enjoy the Outdoors and Safe Journey."

The local Four Town Novices fashioned a 2-1 win over their Wexford counterparts in the same arena Sunday.

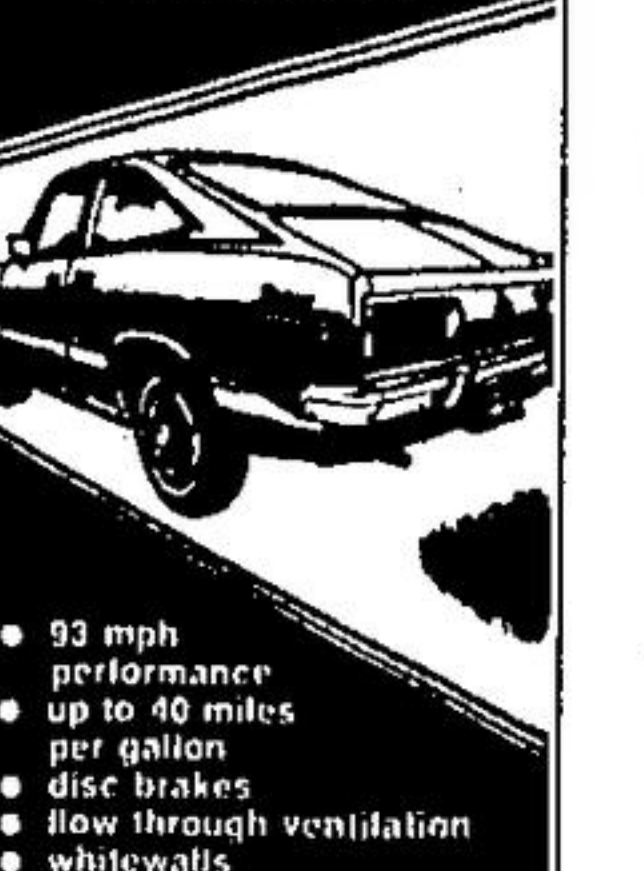
