

# Georgetown Prominent Winners Ontario Youth Bowling Finals

Sherwood Lanes in Hamilton was the site of this year's southern Ontario Provincial Finals held on Sunday. The 540 participants represented 79 bowling centres in 15 different zones, throughout southern Ontario.

Georgetown Bowl stole the show as they placed two teams on top, one more team 4th and a singles bowler sixth.

The Bantam Girls started out very strong and led after the second game by 2 pins. Then, they decided to have that dreaded 'bad game.' But that bad game wasn't bad enough as they hung on to defeat a second place Bowl-O-Drome team from Chatham by a mere 15 pins.

Next the junior boys team bowled. They started out exactly the opposite way that the Bantam Girls did. After their first game of 972, they were 5th 49 pins behind first. Their second game was quite an improvement, 1078. This put them third, 38 pins behind first. Then they tucked it away with an 1156 a total of 3196, 133 pins up on a second place Sherwood Lanes team from Hamilton.

The Senior Boys team started out well with a 1063, ten pins down from two teams tied for 1st. A lot of bad luck caught

them in the 2nd game as they rolled about 960. In 3rd game they tossed over 1200 for but it wasn't enough to stop a very strong team from Mountain Lanes in Hamilton who finished with a terrific 1333 for a grand total of 3517.

# Little League Ball For 6-7 Lads is Possibility

The 1971 season could be the biggest one for minor baseball in Georgetown if the results of the first day's registration are to be considered. A number of new names are included in Saturday's registrations. There will be two more Saturday registration sessions.

From the inquiries it appears that boys as young as six and seven want to get into the game and it just might be possible. If enough youngsters born in 1963 or 1964 sign up the Georgetown Baseball Association will set up a little league for them to operate Monday nights.

Parents with boys in this age bracket are asked to register him on either March 13 or 27, but without the registration fee. If sufficient response is gained GBA will then collect the fee — likely \$3.

**ALL STARS MUST SIGN**

This year, registration fee in the 8-20 years age group is \$5 with the maximum \$10 per family. The maximum includes the six and seven year olds as well as older boys.

The GBA is asking that all boys wishing to play ball register including last year's house league players and all star team members as well as new comers.

Like everything else, the

cost of running baseball is going up, but the GBA says the main reason for increased fees this year is that they intend to supply some type of baseball pants, something the house league has not had in previous years.

Whether that plan comes about or not will depend on the state of their finances after signing up is completed, a list of players, managers, coaches and sponsors will appear in The Herald.

**EVERY BOY IN GAME**

All boys in the house league regardless of their ability will

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get their turn at bat and in the field regardless of their ability according to the GBA.

Playing regularly, even the smallest and most timid boys show improvement after a few games and practices, and to good managers and coaches this is more important and self-satisfying than winning.
