Estimate \$64,000 for Widening

The widening of Ontario Street is a \$64,000 question, Roads chairman Harry Levy told council, Monday night.

The proposed widening and reconstruction of Ontario St. a road that has been discussed for many years, would be subsidized 50% by the Department of Highways leaving the town's share at \$32,000.

Cr. Hyde said the plan council adopted is a full width road with a sidewalk. Only a small portion of retaining wall will be necessary under this plan.

Cr. Harry Levy pointed out that the snowmobile by-law was not on the agenda for the night, so the existing by-law would stay in force. "I hope for the sake of my road budget, there won't be any more snow" he joked, and suggested there would be provincial legislation by next season.

Cr. Donna Denison said the Recreation Committee was arranging a meeting with the Snowmobile Club.

Week-end Snow Brings Rash Of District Auto Accidents

Dennis Bentley of Erin suffered a fractured nose and cuts on his leg, March 5, when he lost control of his 1968 Dodge on 27 Sideroad, west of the Esqueving - Chinguacousy town line.

He was treated at Milton District Hospital.

The weekend snow storm resulted in a rash of accidents around the area. The Esqueving - Chinguacousy town line south of 17 Sideroad March 7, saw a collision between Clinton R. Hughes, Con. 7, Esqueving, and Norman News, Con. 5, Chinguacousy.

The Hughes 1968 Ford pickup received minor damage of \$50, but the 1965 Ford driven by News received \$800 damage.

Also on March 7, a three car accident on the 7th line south of 15 Sideroad, caused a total of \$2,500 damage.

Involved in the accident were a 1960 Meteor, driven by Donald McLean of Hamilton, a 1970 Volvo driven by Irene Wilson of Toronto, and a 1960 Dodge driven by Charles Ricci Con. 7, Esqueving.

The greatest damage was done to the Volvo, an estimate of \$2,000. The Meteor's damage amounted to \$300 and the Dodge \$200.

The same day, No. 7 Highway and 22 Sideroad was the scene

of an accident when a 1967 Pontiac driven by Florence Kneeshaw, Weston, collided with a 1968 Plymouth driven by Andreas Swinkels of Limehouse. \$500 damage was done to the Pontiac and \$900 to the Plymouth.

No. 25 Highway was a busy spot for accidents on March 8 with five in the same area.

No. 25 Highway and No. 5 Sideroad was the scene of a collision between a 1967 Dodge driven by Theophilus Prescott, Cooksville and a 1968 Volkswagen driven by Neil Prokie of Toronto. The Prescott car suffered \$75 damage and the Prokie car \$150.

The 1968 Buick, driven by Jean Speaker of Acton received \$900 damage, when in collision with a 1970 Ford pickup driven by Harold Harris, R. R. 4, Acton, on Highway 25, south of Acton. The Ford truck was slightly damaged, with a \$50 estimate.

Still on March 8, at Highway 25 and No. 5 Sideroad a three vehicle accident saw two dump trucks and a car tangle, with the car a 1970 Gremlin, coming off the worst with \$300 damage. The Gremlin was driven by Ronald Buchanan of St. Thomas.

The dump trucks were driven by John Crawford of Milton,

and David Rife of Toronto. The Crawford truck received only \$10 damage and the Rife truck \$100.

Again at the same spot on the same day Frederic Lowe of Streetsville in a 1968 Ford truck, collided with Isabel MacDonald of Acton, in a 1967 Pontiac. Damage to the truck was \$250 and the Pontiac \$200. In addition two highway guide posts were clipped off.

Tuesday, March 9, \$750 damage was done when a 1968 Peugeot driven by Douglas Hines of Acton collided with a 1968 Chevrolet driven by Norma Silcock, also of Acton.

The accident on the Erin-Esqueving town line, just east of 25 Highway, caused \$350 damage to the Peugeot and \$400 damage to the Chev.

Later that same day, Mrs. Barbara Schwab, R. R. 1, Norval received minor cuts to her lip and knee, when her 1964 Rambler collided with a 1961 Pontiac, driven by Ivan Roxburgh, R. R. 2, Georgetown. Damage to the Rambler was estimated at \$600 and to the Pontiac at \$350.

Injuries, Car Damage In Georgetown's Winter Storm

Three people suffered minor injuries in a motor accident on Maple Avenue opposite the post office building Monday morning.

Edgar Evans of Brampton received minor cuts to both hands, Nancy Mandarino, age 4, a cut lip, and Brian Mandarino, age 3, a cut upper gum.

The latter two were in a 1961 Pontiac driven by Frank Mandarino of 192 Maple Ave East which was southbound on Maple. The Evans 1971 Toyota had been parked and was pulling out.

Police put damage to the Evans car at \$350, and to the Mandarino car, \$150.

INJURED JAW

Joseph P. Power of 101 Raylawn Crescent suffered an injured jaw in an accident Sunday night opposite 40 Raylawn Cr. He was driving a 1965 Chrysler eastbound on Raylawn when in collision with a parked 1962 Chevrolet belonging to Lillian F. Barker of 27 Norton Crescent. Damage here was \$700 to the Power car and \$500 to the Barker vehicle.

HIT AT CORNER

Market and William Street was the scene of a two car accident Sunday afternoon in which a 1969 Buick driven by Marion E. Richardson of 6 Durham St. took \$600 damage, and a 1969 Chevelle by Ralph Mulder of 49 Market Street received \$500 damage. The Buick was eastbound on William and the Chevelle southbound on Market when they hit.

PARKED CAR

Another accident the same afternoon involved a 1965 Pontiac operated by Geraldine Osborne of 7 Weber Drive, and a parked 1969 Dodge belonging to Gary Frederick Pollard of Brampton.

This one happened on Weber Drive, opposite house No. 52 and did \$150 damage to the Pontiac and \$75 to the Dodge.
