During the week ending February 27th, officers of the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at North Halton Detachment worked a total of 1,129 hours and patrolled 12,367 miles on area roads under their jurisdiction. A total of 63 motorists were charged for a variety of driving errors while 81 others received warnings. Proceedings in Provincial Court, Milton, resulted in 71 convictions being registered.

Officers investigated 19 General Occurrences during this time period including 1 instance of Break and Enter; 4 investigations under the Liquor Control Act which led to charges against 4 persons; 1 complaint of Willful Damage; 1 Impaired Driver was apprehended and the premise was found insecure by an officer on night patrol. Many other occurrences were of a minor nature and required little time to clear.

It is gratifying to report that only 5 motor vehicle collisions were investigated this week. One of which resulted in injuries to two persons. Total property damage was estimated to be approximately \$2,875. The mishaps were attributed to careless driving, failing to obey stop sign and speed too fast for road or traffic conditions. To date three charges have been laid against persons involved.

Motorists! Here's a reminder from your provincial Dept. of Transport... If for any reason you must stop on a highway, always pull off onto the shoulder, never stop your vehicle on the travelled portion of a highway! This is not only dangerous... It's against the law. And make sure the road is clear before you pull back on the road again. These are simple precautions, but they can help prevent collisions.

Propose Egg Quota to Boost Market Prices

Committeemen chosen to represent this area at the annual meeting of the Halton-Peel Egg Producers Association on Thursday were — Ken Ella of Hornby, Mrs. E. J. Maxwell of Acton, Clifford Wrigglesworth of Georgetown, John Hamilton of Mississauga and Art Miedma of Malton.

Mrs. Maxwell was returned as president, Ken Ella vice president, and Mrs. Ken Ella secretary - treasurer.

The highlight of the meeting was a discussion on the proposed marketing plan for eggs in Ontario. To explain some of the proposals in the new plan were Mr. Beatty, chairman and Mr. Brian Ellsworth, secretary manager of the Ontario Egg and Fowl Producers Marketing Board.

PROPOSING QUOTAS
This marketing plan is proposing quotas on the number of dozens of eggs marketed by each producer and will also attempt to fix a price on these eggs within the quota. This marketing plan has been precipitated by the very low prices currently being received by egg producers. These depressed prices are a result of over supply and poor pricing methods. It is being suggested that the quotas be set on production in a 12 month period during the past couple of years. This would tend to rule out those who want to rush out and build poultry buildings at the present time.

James Snow, MMP for Halton East, was a guest speaker. He pointed out that the milk industry is now a very stable part of agriculture as a result of its marketing plan. He felt, however, that a quota on the number of birds would be more desirable than on the number of dozens of eggs marketed.

LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

If you look at these hands you won't see anything unusual about them. In fact, I wouldn't notice anything except that no one bid game when these hands came up at the Acton Bridge Club.

West dealt with North-South vulnerable.

Suggested bidding:

Opening Lead: Seven of clubs. South is the only hand to hold enough points to open the bidding and he does so with a bid of one spade. North holds enough points (at least ten) to respond at the two level. After North bids two clubs, South must take some positive action. Two South players chose to bid just two spades and the bidding died right there. In another auction, West came in with diamonds and played at four diamonds, down several.

South's hand is worth at least seventeen points and I would count it for 18. South cannot rebid two spades which would show only 13 to 15 points. South must jump and the only jump available is to three spades.

North can raise this to four since he had sound value for his two club bid and three card support for spades as well. On the club lead, declarer called for the queen. East should play low since it will not promote any tricks by cov-

ering. Declarer has several choices of play. Not necessarily the best, but one that worked well with these cards is as follows:

After the club queen holds, declarer draws three rounds of trumps being careful to win the third round in dummy. The club jack is led and again East refuses to cover.

A low club takes care of East's king, while declarer wins with the ace. A low diamond is won by West who shifts to hearts but it is too late. Declarer wins and enters dummy with the diamond queen. Declarer loses are discarded on dummy's good clubs, making six on a hand where most pairs bid to a part score.
