Gave Name to One of Town's New Streets

A lifelong district resident William Henry Reid, 89, died in Georgetown hospital on February 28.

He farmed on Guelph Street, just out of town limits until 1964 when his was one of several farms incorporated in the Delrex subdivision, then moved to a new home which he built on 22 Sideroad. The family name is perpetuated in a Delrex street, Reid Court.

Son of Robert Fraser Reid and Agnes Craig, he attended Stewarttown public school. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church.

In 1915 he married Margaret Inglis, who survives, with a family of five, H. Craig of Milton, Weir of Sudbury, Bruce of Mount Hope, Herbert of Manitoulin Island and Agnes, Mrs. W. J. Long of Chatham. He also leaves 16 grandchildren and a sister, Josephine, Mrs. C. H. Hilyer, Niagara Falls. He was predeceased by brothers Robert of Georgetown, Fraser of Toronto, Weir of Norval and Jim, Perdue, Saskatchewan.

Rev. Norman Young conducted the funeral service at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were Paul and Brian Reid, Sudbury, Craig and Jim Reid, and Gordon Inglis, Georgetown, and Blake Inglis, Glen Williams. Flower bearers were John, Scott and Michael Reid, Glenn, Ronald and Steve Long.

"REGIONAL STREETS"

Committee Approves Plan For Exchange of Roads

The Halton county roads committee last week gave draft approval to the Roads Needs Study prepared by Duncan Hopper and Associates in 1969.

Final approval still has to be given by a full meeting of county council March 16. Included in the study is a

proposal that Halton and several municipalities exchange responsibilities for certain roads.

TOWN STREETS

Oakville would assume take over parts of the First Line, Lower Base Line Rd., and Henderson Rd., while parts of Tremaine Rd. and Upper

Middle Rd. would be turned over to Halton.

Milton would turn over (to the county) Bronte St. from Anne Blvd. to Main St.; Main St. from Bronte to Ontario; and Martin St. from Main St. to Base Line Rd.

Among the streets and roads that would be turned over to Halton by Georgetown are Main St., River Dr., Maple Ave. East and Mountainview Road.

Delegations from all three towns quizzed the roads committee on the new proposal.

REGIONAL

Chairman of the committee, Burlington reeve Jim Swanborough, told all three delegations the takeovers were designed to give the county a pattern of streets and roads which would eventually fit in with a regional pattern of streets.

He told them the municipalities would maintain the roads and charge back maintenance costs to the county.

MORE INFORMATION

One of the biggest problems facing the town of Milton, deputy reeve Percy Barr told the committee, was that the town is re-

ady to sell \$165,000 worth of debentures to cover their share of the rebuilding of the east end of Main St.

"Will the county take this on at the same time they assume the roads?" he asked.

Neither Swanborough nor county engineer Jack Corbett could give him an answer.

Although the report has been ready for some months, its contents have never been made public yet and the delegations all complained they had not enough information as to county policies.

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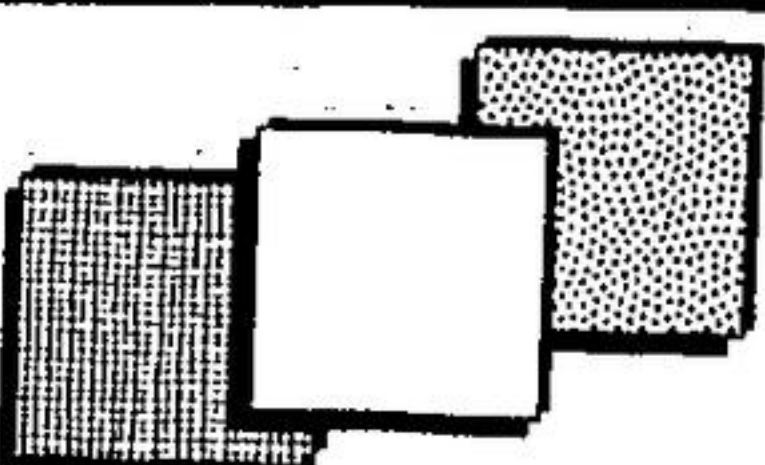
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
