## 41 Years a Teacher Retiring in June

When he retires in June, Al Prouse, head of the guidance department at Georgetown High School, will have completed 41 years in the teaching profession.

He began his teaching career in 1930 in a two room school in Reaboro, near Lindsay where he was principal and taught Grades 6, 7, 8 and 9.

**CROSSED ICE TO SCHOOL**

After six years in Reaboro he moved to a Continuation School on Wolfe Island, near Kingston, where in winter he walked across the ice to school, and in summer took the ferry. Mr. Prouse stayed there four years, teaching Grades 9 and 10.

In 1940, Clarendon, north-east of Toronto, became his home. At this school, four teachers taught all subjects from Grade 1 to Grade 12. Mr. Prouse taught Grades 9 to 12.

**HERE 28 YEARS**

Five years later he arrived at Georgetown High School where he has spent the last 28 years. In 1945, when he joined the staff, principal J. L. Lambert, was still overseas, and H. Keenan was acting as principal until his return.

Through the years he has taught mathematics, history, geography and physical education, and was cadet instructor for many years. Later he entered the guidance field, where he is now the department head.

He plans to relax with his favourite sports, bowling and horseshoes, and may try golf and curling. Fixing up the cottage will be another hobby since he is fond of carpentry.

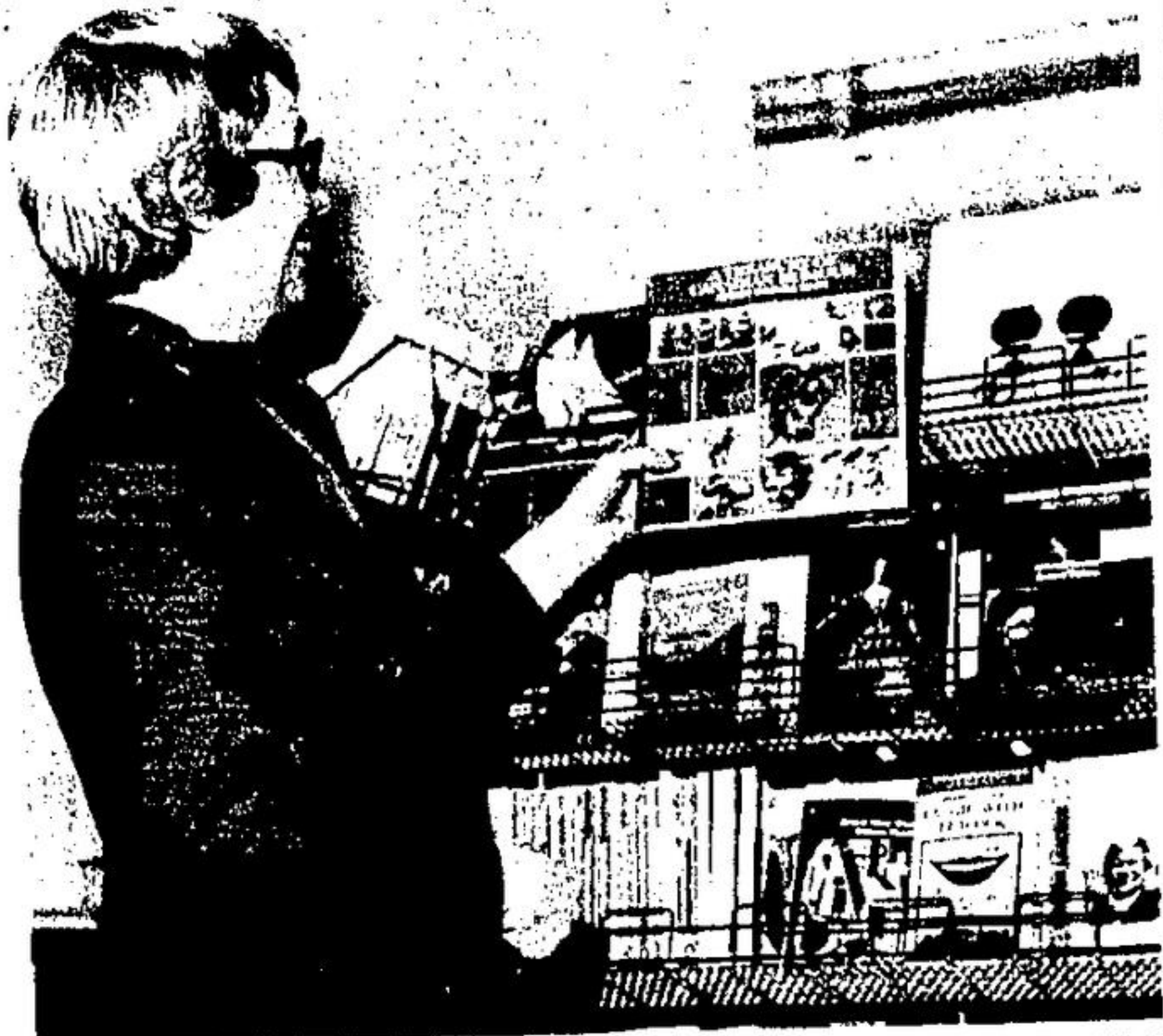

## Brilliant Goaltending Puts Raiders One Up in Playoffs

Raiders eliminated Welland from the Niagara Peninsula League Intermediate A playoffs Tuesday night by beating them 11-3 in the fourth game of the best three out of five series.

Welland rained 36 shots at the Georgetown goal Sunday — and all of them hit Brian Chapman. The Raider goalie with the cat-like reflexes was reason Georgetown Raiders came away from the canal town leading their best three out of five Niagara Peninsula Intermediate A Hockey League series two games to one.

Georgetown's gunners managed only 21 shots on Welland's Errol McKibbin, but one fired by Al Blair in the first period, and another launched by Don Currie in the second gave Raiders a 2-0 victory.

Currie and Blake Inglis set up the Blair goal, and Inglis and Steve Blundy worked on Currie's. Each was scored in the fourth minute of play in their respective periods.

### SHOOTING MARGIN

Welland had a shooting edge in every frame, 8-5 in the first, 15-8 in the second and 13-6 in the scoreless third.

Raiders were assessed eight minor penalties, and Welland five minors and a major. The five minute sentence was given Al Boone for fighting in an altercation with Raiders scoring ace Al Stitt who took a two minute roughing call.

The victory was the second in a row for Raiders who dropped the opening game of the set in Welland 7-4 March 7.

### BIG THIRD

A spectacular effort in the third period enabled Georgetown to pull even in games when they played here Friday night. Six Raider salvos in the final period produced a 7-3 win.

Raiders were trailing 3-1 and tangled in Welland's blanket-checking when wirey Steve Blundy ignited the spark that lit their fire.

With six and a half minutes gone in the last frame Al Blair raced down the right boards and laid a pass out in front of the Welland net. Blundy, staying with him at centre, dove heading and caught enough of the puck with the heel of his stick to deflect it past McKibbin.

The play lifted the Memorial Arena crowd off their hands and put the rest of his mates into high gear.

### SWITCH GOALIES

Doug Lucas' back-hand from 10 feet in front had the game knotted less than a minute later. He repeated with the winning goal from Doucette and Doug Selby before another two minutes had gone by.

Don Norton, who had scored Raiders' first goal early in the second period, counted his second and Raiders fifth from Junior Tibbetts in the next minute of play as Welland crumbled. Al Blair made it 6-3 off his back-hand unassisted at with five minutes to go. And Tibbetts from Stitt and Norton ran it to seven at 18:25. The last two goals were scored on Pete Jenkins who went in for McKibbin at 19:54.

Brian Angelo from Krupa and Bassi put Welland in front 1-0 in the first period. Al Boone un-

assisted, and Jerry Maney from Bassi and Boone struck for them in the second period. Welland outshot Raiders 18-15 in the second frame after an 11-11 first frame. But Raiders third period surge gave them a 23-7 shot margin in that span.
