

# Re-Elect Four New Members Annual Hospital Meeting

The main order of business was the election of directors for the ensuing three year term. Four who had served on the board previously were re-elected: Leslie Clark, Terry Baines, E. W. Binkley and Judge John Ord.

The first Board meeting of the year will be held tonight, March 18th, and will see the Board electing its slate of officers for the ensuing year.

The annual meeting opened with Board chairman Les Clark

welcoming the gathering, and a short review of the past year was given. The various reports were detailed in the attractive booklet that contained the reports, and questions were invited by the chairman.

The auditor was reappointed, Mr. Walter Pope, who has held this position since the inception of the Hospital.

Plans of the proposed expansion were shown on the walls of the room, and a great deal of interest was shown in them.

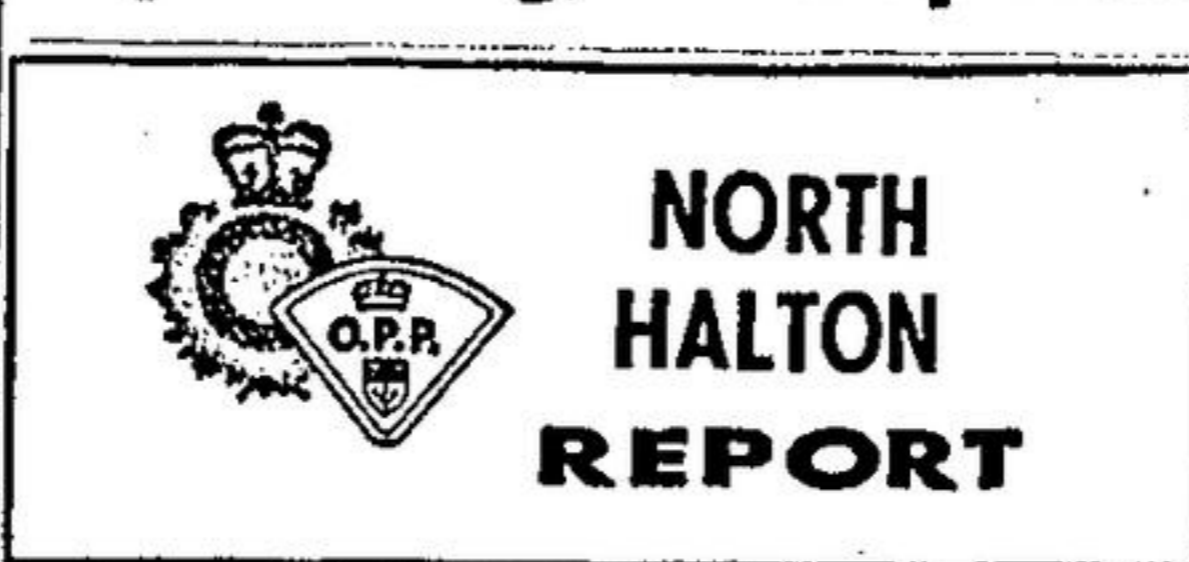
The Administrator, Fred Whitaker, gave a short report, on the operation of the hospital, and brought the audience up to

date with the stage the expansion planning was in. He reported having visited the Commission the previous day, and that a reply was expected within a week.

The chairman mentioned the fact that Dr. C. A. Thompson had been on the local TV station in an interview the night before, and had, in his opinion at least, done an excellent job of explaining many of the problems that face the hospital and medical profession, problems that the public are generally unaware of.

After a motion of adjournment refreshments were served and a social time spent.

# Expect Mushroom Cannery Operating in September



During the week ending March 6th, officers of the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at North Halton detachment worked a total of 1,146 3/4 hours and patrolled 12,627 miles on area roads under their jurisdiction. Charges were laid against 104 motorists for a variety of driving offences while an additional 98 received warnings for minor driving infractions. Proceedings in Provincial Court, Milton, led to convictions being registered against 24 persons.

Officers were called upon to investigate 28 general occurrences during this time period. Included in this number were: 4 thefts, 2 instances of break and enter, 1 assault investigation; 1 complaint of willful damage; 1 trespassing complaint; 1 investigation under the Liquor Control Act resulted in 1 charge being laid; 1 impaired driver apprehended and 2 premises

With opposition of some neighbouring residents withdrawn, Meadowglen Mushroom Growers Ltd. expects to start construction about mid-April on a cannery on their Mountainview Road North property.

Last week, Ernie Skrow, managing director of the company, attended a Planning Board meeting, along with a group of residents, and a solution was arrived at agreeable to all parties.

The board has recommended that town council approve the plan which calls for a building set back 182 feet from the Mountainview property line.

Mr. Skrow says the 150' x 100' structure will be of dark brown brick with cedar shingles, with office windows tinted

brown to give a warm effect. The building will blend into the residential character of the street, he says.

He plans to have an initial staff of 25. Some two million pounds of mushrooms will be canned yearly, and he hopes to be in production in September.

The Meadowglen firm took over the business, established some years before, in 1960 and employs about 60 people in its growing operations. It supplies major food chains and some canneries with its two varieties of mushrooms.

## Truck Plates on Sale This Month

This month is the "headache" time for local truckers, as they purchase their new truck plates. This year more than usual, the licensing period presents very real problems. This is due to the new system of licensing, whereby the size of the truck axle is the guiding factor in the license and the price you pay. However there is a period of grace, and five years is granted to present truck owners. However, new trucks are subject to the regulations now, and many trucking firms are busy licensing trucks under the new regulations.

Both truckers and Dept. of Transport employees have had various courses to familiarize themselves with the new regulations. The Dept. of Transport has held several seminars for their agency heads at the Department headquarters at Queen's Park. The various associations of truckers, have been holding a series of meetings for their members and having various Department officials at them to explain how the new system will work.

This year the licensing of ordinary trailers has been changed. Other years owners have been able to obtain these plates on a three month basis, but this year they are available only for a yearly period, and the fee has been lowered to \$5.00. It is thought that this change is due to the vastly increased use in trailers by owners in seasons other than the summer period. Particularly is this true with winter sports, and the increase in number of snowmobiles.

Quarterly truck plates went on sale last Monday.

The local registrar of motor vehicles, Mrs. Bea Clark, says there are approximately 1,000 trucks to be licensed in the area, if last year's figures are a guideline. Mrs. Clark operates the Dept. office at 41 Main South, in conjunction with her income tax return and book-keeping business. The location is on the west side of Main Street, the second building past the Presbyterian Church.

Put on your headlights — not sidelights — when visibility is bad, asks the Ontario Safety League. And remember, when the slush is flying, even if you can see well, another driver whose windshield washer is not working may be driving in what is virtually a thick fog. Use your headlights to see, and to be seen.
