Specialists on Platform For Limehouse Parents

Limehouse school was the scene of lively discussion when the topic Meet Your School Age Child was presented on March 8 as an introduction to education week in Ontario schools.

Miss Davey, psychologist for Halton County Board of Education, began the evening by presenting parents with a checklist. She left an open invitation for parents to discuss with her any aspect of the list which concerned them.

Mrs. Henderson, speech teacher, presented a provocative paper concerning the case study of a student with learning problems. From this presentation much information evolved concerning the services offered by Halton County Board of Education and the Health Unit when a student has learning problems. It was pointed out that it sometimes is a long process to get a child with learning difficulties on the right track, but the services do their utmost to help any child who has problems.

Miss Randall of the Halton County Health Unit discussed nutrition and the role of nutrition in the school age child. She stressed the importance of good eating habits, and a balanced diet as a prerequisite for learning readiness. There was some discussion regarding supplement of vitamin pills, but Miss Randall felt that a good balanced diet was all that was really necessary in order to maintain a good standard of health.

Mrs. Scruton, the Primary Consultant for Limehouse school and area number one of Halton County Board of Education outlined the characteristics of children from four to eleven years. Because of the general characteristics of age groups, parents and teachers were able to understand the traits of their students a little better. A lively discussion followed Mrs. Scruton's presentation and continued through a finale including coffee and cookies. Further meetings similar to the meeting held tonight will be discussed with parents and personnel of the County.

Was Third Generation to Serve as Merchant in Glen

Third generation of his family to serve as a merchant and postmaster in Glen Williams, Harold C. Wheeler died suddenly at his home there on March 9.

Son of John A. and Ida Elizabeth Wheeler, he had a deep affection for the village where he spent his life and often stated that "everything I wanted, I found right here."

He attended public school in the Glen and Georgetown High School. For almost 27 years he was postmaster and operated the Wheeler grocery store. A fine musician, he played E flat horn for many years with the Georgetown band, often a prizewinner at the CNE. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge.

He leaves his wife, Irene (Nan) Tost; two sons Harold William (Bill) and Martin Douglas (Marty); a grandson William Kyle Wheeler; brother Andrew of Toronto and sisters Mrs. Phares Vannatter (Mary) of Georgetown and Mrs. Charles O'Hara (Margaretta) of Toronto.

He was predeceased by a granddaughter Amber Lynn and brothers Winfield and Winston of Glen Williams and Russell, Fort Erie.

Funeral service in Glen Williams United Church on March 11 was conducted by Rev. Walter Ridley. Mrs. Harold Inglis was organist. Pallbearers were Ross Giles, Mervyn Kirby, Herbert Preston, Robert Heaton, Ernest Forgrave and Kenneth Beam. Timmins. Flower bearers were Donnie Beaumont, Mike Sargent, Bob Engleby, Ken Engleby, Mitch Wagstaffe and Bryon Foreman, Grand Valley. Interment was in Glen Williams cemetery.

A touching tribute was contributed in verse by a friend, Ross Giles, when he learned of Mr. Wheeler's death.

ESQUESING COUNCIL BRIEFS

Esquesing council, Monday decided to inform the North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded, that donations are given by Halton County, part of which is paid by Esquesing township in their county level. The association had asked for a grant.

They had no objection to the Holy Cross Charitable Association holding binges in the Riviera. Township approval is now necessary for the applicant to receive a license from the Lotteries Branch of the provincial government.

The Esquesing's share of the Grand River Conservation Authority budget for 1971 is \$512.

Council okayed the extension of a building permit to Thomas Grey, of Burlington, on land he owns on Con. 1, Lot 20. The original permit has expired, since sickness prevented the Greys building at the original time. Council stated the permit was not transferable.

Esquesing council will be among the 59 councillors from all over Halton attending the joint meeting in Holiday Inn, April 1.

Keith Webb, R. R. 2, Norval was given permission to extend his greenhouses. "It is an agricultural use and doesn't contravene the holding-by-law" commented Reeve Tom Hill.

A used V plough will be bought from Dominion Road Machinery for \$700.

NEW BRIDGE PLANNED 10th LINE

A new bridge will be built on the 10th Line, east of Glen Williams to replace the existing one.

Monday night, Esquesing council approved a recommendation by the road superintendent and the consulting engineer to go ahead with the project. They will call for tenders subject to the approval of the Department of Highways.

Esquesing's reeve and deputy reeve will serve on a joint committee from Milton, Nassagaweya, and Esquesing to investigate the possibility of using an abandoned pit on land owned by Milton Brick as a garbage disposal site, for the three communities.

The sanitary land fill site has been inspected, but will be reviewed again when the snow melts.
