**FLY TYING**

Another good streamer fly pattern for fly tyers to test their skill on is the Alexandria. It's tied on a 3 or 4x long streamer round bend or limerick size 6 or 8 is a good size.

The tail is of red hackle fibres; Body is of flat medium silver Unsel; Wing is of a medium bunch of peacock sword fibres; Cheek is of guinea hen dyed red or similar material; Dressing of Jungle Cock eye over this and the hackle is of black hen wound on collar style. Place lots of head cement on the finished head.

The result is a fabulous fly and a real good taker of specks, rainbow, brown trout and other game fish.
