GDHS Student Will Get Trip to United Nations

Mrs. Jack Watson, Noble Grand of Georgetown's Verdun Rebekah Lodge 184 announced this week that plans are well advanced for the 22nd annual Odd Fellows' United Nations Pilgrimage for Youth to be held in New York this summer. Arrangements are being made with Georgetown District High School for selection of a delegate to join the one thousand teenage high school students who will converge on the UN through this project which is sponsored by the Independent Order of Odd Fellows and its companion organization the Rebekahs.

TO BE ELIGIBLE

To be eligible, students must have completed the 10th or 11th grade by June, be 16 or 17 years of age at the time of the Pilgrimage and be in good health. Scholarship, leadership, interest in community welfare, concern in world affairs and general fitness are all taken into account in making the selection.

While at the UN, the young delegates will observe this great world-wide organization in action, tour the buildings, hear business conducted in the five official languages, listen to authoritative explanations of various departments and agencies, enjoy meals in the UN Delegates' Dining Room, and interview representatives of member nations.

IN THE MAIL BAG

Some Reasons For Not Having Airport Here

Dear Sir:
There would appear to be several good reasons for not having a new airport in this area as per a mail bag letter of a week ago.

First is the land area estimated to be required for this, from 60 to 80 thousand acres. Where is it available?

Secondly, I would think this area would conflict with present Malton flight patterns.

Third, with the advent of proposed jumbo jets in the New York area, it has been estimated the noise pollution would increase so much that homes within 10 miles of Kennedy and O'Hare airport would have to be sound-proofed at a cost of \$5,000 upwards. This type of pollution should do away with outside activities in the summer around Georgetown, to say nothing of atmosphere pollution from fuel dumping, take-offs, etc.

A more rural area such as Orangeville, north of Toronto area would seem to be much preferable.

The availability or types of jobs this type of installation requires would unlikely be available for another three or four years if a start was made this year. As for as construction goes, it seems probable that a project of this size, as usual, would be a union job and require skilled union members to be employed on it.
