Canadian National Railways steam locomotive 6218 rolls across the Iron Bridge at the eastern entrance to the Georgetown yard on her last run through here Sunday. Steam buffs were out in force Saturday and Sunday morning when the CN's last operating steam engine made farewell runs carrying members of the Upper Canada Railway Society on excursions. Sunday's trip ended in a banquet for the passengers at the Royal Connaught Hotel in Hamilton. Georgetowners took a nostalgic last look at the 4-8-4 Northern type engine when it made stops here shortly after 10 a.m. Saturday and Sunday.

## Queries Loitering By-Law Main St. for Gatherings

The town anti-loitering by-law came under attack, Monday night, by Grade 13 student Farley Helfant.

He questioned its necessity, council's right to pass it, and the method of enforcement. He suggested Main Street as a town centre should be looked at in a broader context, and used as in Greek and Roman times, both as centre of commerce and a gathering place for the people.

### Add Fifth Member to Town Law Firm

Raymond L. Steele, formerly of Fort Frances, has now commenced the practice of law in Georgetown in association with F. A. Helson, T. F. Baines, K. A. Langdon and J. R. Belleghem, in the law firm of Helson, Baines and Langdon.

After graduating with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1965 from the University of Manitoba, he attended Osgoode Hall in Toronto and in 1968, upon receiving his Bachelor of Laws Degree, was awarded the Northern Ontario prize.

Upon being called to the degree of Barrister-at-law and upon being admitted as a solicitor of the Supreme Court of Ontario in 1970, he was selected as law clerk to the Chief Justice of Ontario, the Honourable George A. Gale, for a period of one year prior to joining this law firm. As law clerk to the Chief Justice of Ontario, he worked for the Judges of the Court of Appeal for Ontario.

Mr. Steele is an avid curler and golfer. He is also interested in music, having formerly studied violin and trombone. As well, although now out of practice he is an enthusiastic gymnast and swimming instructor.

He has moved to Georgetown with his wife, the former Elizabeth Ann Avis, also originally from Fort Frances, and his infant daughter Jana Rae.

F. A. Helson and K. A. Langdon are also graduates of Osgoode Hall, having respectively been called to the bar in 1957 and 1964. Mr. Helson immediately began practice in Georgetown and has been here ever since. Mr. Langdon, a Georgetown native commenced practice with the firm of Richardson MacMillan, Rooke and MacLennan, in Toronto, of whom Mr. Justice Richardson is now a justice of the Supreme Court of Ontario. After practicing in Toronto for 3 1/2 years, Mr. Langdon moved to Georgetown to join Mr. Helson in partnership in 1966.

T. F. Baines and J. R. Belleghem are both graduates of the Faculty of Law of the University of Toronto being called to the bar respectively in 1960 and 1967. Mr. Baines immediately moved to Georgetown and joined D. V. Latimer, present Halton Crown Attorney in the law firm of Dale, Bennett, Latimer and Baines. Mr. Belleghem joined the merged firm of Helson, Baines and Langdon in early 1969 after two years in Toronto with the same firm in which Mr. Langdon began his practice. Mr. Belleghem is now a partner with Helson, Baines and Langdon.

### Cars in Second Crash While First Being Investigated

A disagreement between a car and a hydro pole guy support resulted in \$210 property damage Tuesday. A police report said D. Fuller of 122 Delrex Boulevard, in a 1967 Dodge skidded on ice on Faludon Drive near Delrex Boulevard, mounted a snowbank and struck the support.

The investigating officer put damage at \$190 to the car and \$30 to the hydro property. It was one of five accidents handled by the Georgetown police this past week.

when in collision with Parker, also westbound. Damage was \$75 and \$50 to Duguay's 1968 Pontiac and Parker's 1971 Volkswagen.

Four hundred dollars damage \$200 to each car, was the result of a collision on Victoria Crescent Sunday. Peter Harsynczuk of Scarborough was backing his 1968 Chevelle from a private drive when in an accident with a 1969 GMC pick-up truck driven by Charles Hill of 12 Victoria Avenue.

There were two accidents Friday afternoon and two cars were involved in both of them.

Denis Parent of 102 Prince Charles Drive, and P. Houston of Acton collided on Guelph St. just west of Sinclair, at 3:30 resulting in \$600 damage to the Parent car, a 1970 Maverick, and \$400 damage to Houston's 1968 Chev.

Fifteen minutes later, while the two cars were on the shoulder of the road, a 1968 Buick convertible driven by Eli Jones of 177 Mountainview Road hit the Houston car and knocked it into the Parent car. In this one damage was \$600 to the front of Jones' car, another \$80 to Houston's and another \$20 to Parent's.

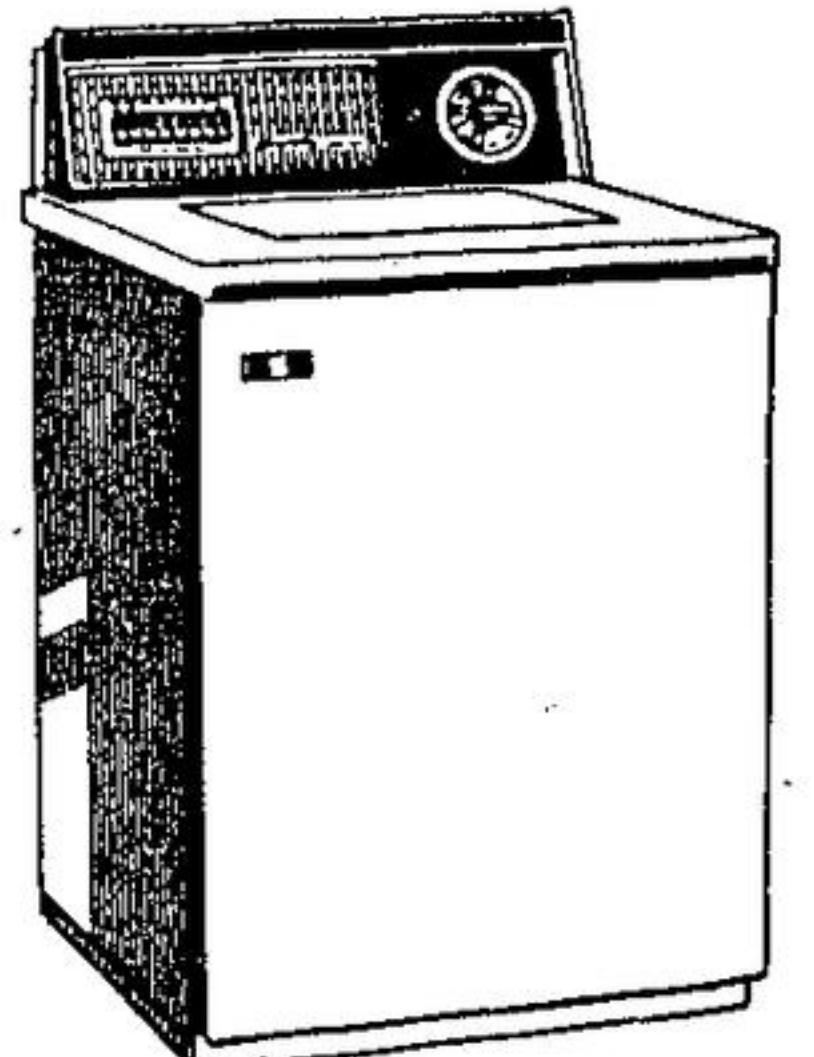
