Tells How Junk Metal Becomes Works of Art

Mrs. Les Ann Ciglen and Mrs. Lynda Tyrrell, both members of the Zeta Phi Chapter of the Beta Sigma Phi Sorority, presented their cultural program entitled Sculpture with the aid of James Forbes a local sculptor who specializes in 'found objects', but who also does wood carving and types of concrete masks.

Mrs. Ciglen introduced Mr. Forbes. Three years ago he became inspired with the beam and peg works of Josef Drentners and since then, although only a hobby, sculpturing has become an important part of his life. Each year he creates about 100 pieces and sells approximately 75. Mr. Percy Saxo displays Mr. Forbes work in Toronto and surrounding areas and consequently many pieces have been given as gifts, purchased by tourists and buyers from other provinces.

Mr. Forbes brought a display of some of his work for the members to examine, and he also showed some of the found objects he uses in his work. The objects he uses are the kind of thing many people would throw into the garbage, onto the scrap pile or just leave to rot. Most of the pieces are parts of old farm implements or pieces of mechanism.

For example there was a 2 lb. weight as a base, this was taken from an old pendulum clock. Balanced on this was the bit from a horse, a ring attached either side, with these simple 'found objects' a figure was formed. A pot-bellied stove leg, a piece of litter carrier, the head from a bedstead and a flower from a door knocker gave an animal form.

Mr. Forbes takes different pieces and lays them on a table and when the form has taken shape he then welds it together, it takes about one hour to set a medium sized piece and approximately two hours to complete.

Mrs. Tyrrell thanked Mr. Forbes and presented him with a very attractive pen and pencil holder for his desk as a token of appreciation.

Sewers, Water Necessity For Residential Building

Houses can no longer be built in town without municipal sewer and water services, according to a by-law passed Monday night by council.

The by-law stated there could be no residential construction unless sewers and piped municipal water were arranged for, and no occupancy until the installation was completed.

"UNJUST"
Cr. Ern Hyde strongly opposed the by-law saying it was unjust to people who have been paying taxes for years in the town. He pointed out it wasn't their fault the municipality has not installed the services that they have paid for through taxation. "I am talking about lands abutting roadways in existence since the town began, not raw lands to be developed," he emphasized.

Mayor Bill Smith agreed there would be cases falling into the category described by Cr. Hyde, but contended council would have to deal with them when they arose.

THIRD READING
Cr. Hyde claimed the town would be defeating its purpose in passing this by-law, since smaller lots were permissible where town services are available. He reminded council there were valuable houses on Mountainview Rd. N. with no sewer services, and claimed Ontario Street, which is also not serviced would have larger houses with increased assessment if this by-law was defeated.

A hassle developed when Cr. Hyde asked for the deferment of the third reading, a custom in the past. Mayor Smith backed him saying it had always been done when a councillor asked for it before. The other members over-ruled the objections and the third reading was given.
