The Halton 4-H Club leaders held a meeting on March 10 to plan the 4-H program to be offered this year. As a result of the survey sheets, asking members to indicate their areas of interest, the following clubs are to be established: Halton 4-H Beef Calf Club, Halton 4-H Holstein Calf Club, Halton 4-H Jersey-Guernsey-Dual Purpose Short-horn Calf Club, Halton 4-H Conservation Club, Halton 4-H Field Crop Club, Halton 4-H Sheep Club, Halton 4-H Horse Club, Halton 4-H Engineering Club, Acton 4-H Calf Club and Acton 4-H Field Crop Club.

Georgetown Police Report

Five thefts of over \$50, 17 of under \$50 and three break-and-enter cases are included in the Georgetown Police Department's February activity report. Also listed under Occurrences are one car theft, one fraud, six missing persons and one sudden death.

Georgetown police laid a total of 153 charges during February and issued 88 parking tags.

Ninety-five of the charges were laid under the Highway Traffic Act, most of them for speed violations, 18 under the Liquor Control Act, 17 under the Criminal Code of Canada and 23 under by-laws.

Fines imposed totalled \$2,275. There were 13 arrests made during the month and 96 summonses issued.

Complaints investigated totalled 257.

Twenty-six motor accidents resulted in damage over \$200, 18 involved minor damage, two injuries resulted from accidents. Charges were laid against nine drivers.

There were also 34 private dwellings checked and 15 properties found insecure.
