**County Grants \$50,400
Morrow Loses Battle**

Georgetown Reeve Ric Morrow, an outspoken critic of county grants to charities and organizations, fought a losing battle against the annual donations by Halton County Council last week, aided by his staunch supporter Reeve Allan Masson of Oakville.

The recommendations were approved in committee of the whole, and will be reviewed again at a special budget meeting next Tuesday. Despite the battle, council's recommendations ended up \$12,400 ahead of last year's grants for a total of \$50,400.

WHOPPING INCREASE

A whopping \$10,000 increase went to the Royal Botanical Gardens, after a spirited plea by Burlington Reeve James Swanborough, calling the Gardens an asset to the whole county, and likened it to the Halton County Museum. The Botanical Gardens proposed grant is now \$20,000.

A motion by Morrow and Masson to reduce the Botanical Gardens grant to zero, found no support.

The Plowmen's Association tentatively were increased \$1,000 and the Sheltered Workshops \$2,400. Sheltered workshops are controlled by legislation on a per capita basis.

The Lorne Scots Regiment grant was sliced \$500 down to \$1,000 and Mutual Fire Aid grant was dropped \$200 to \$1,000.

ABSOLUTE FARCE

Shortly after council started down the list of 20 requests, Reeve Ric Morrow jumped to his feet, branding the system an absolute "farce". "I am so disgusted I feel like leaving this council chamber," he said.

"If he feels like leaving I'll help him out," chuckled Esqueungue Tom Hill.

"Five organizations covered in five minutes is not serious consideration, or any consideration," Morrow charged.

CAN'T JUSTIFY

Morrow argued there was no priority in granting the donations, and challenged council to explain why Mutual Aid should receive \$1,000, St. John Ambulance \$200, Muscular Dystrophy \$100 and the plowmen \$1,550.

"You cannot justify the differences and be honest with yourself," he maintained.

Reeve Morrow has said all along that Halton residents should donate money to charity of their own free will, and should not be required to give through taxation.

"Unless we can set priorities I can't agree to any of them," he remarked.

**Doesn't Want Opinion
From Ex-Reeve Hunter**

County council action in hiring Hunter Real Estate, Georgetown, to give an opinion on the value of a piece of property in Campbellville, for road widening, brought objection from Reeve Ric Morrow. Last month he objected to a similar motion authorizing Hunter Real Estate to do an appraisal, this time the motion asked for a "letter of opinion" rather than an appraisal.

He termed Morrow's suggestions good ones, and promised to follow them in the future.

TOURNEY POPULAR

Lots of action at the arena this week, as teams arrive for the 11th annual International Bantam Hockey Tournament. It concludes Saturday night with the grand championship game.

WOULD TENDER

Morrow said he had asked for an investigation into the qualifications of various real estate companies to do appraisals. Last month he suggested the Real Estate Boards be asked to supply a list of qualified appraisers who would then tender for county jobs.

"It doesn't seem quite right to me that a member of last year's road committee should be getting business from this council," he remarked.

VERY MINOR

Road chairman James Swanborough, reeve of Burlington, said this was a very minor job which had to be done immediately. "I haven't got a guilty conscience, I don't know the gentleman, and never worked with him," he replied.
