Approve \$100,000 Purchase Plans for Escarpment Land

The gradual take-over of Niagara Escarpment lands in Halton was started last week when the Halton Region Conservation Authority approved the spending of \$100,000 for purchase of escarpment land.

HRCA general manager Murray Stephen said the money could buy up to 1,000 acres of land at the going price of \$800 an acre.

This is the first year a purchase of escarpment land is being undertaken.

LONG RANGE

It is part of a long-range plan of the provincial government to preserve the escarpment in its natural state, adopting many of the recommendations made in the 1969 Gertler Report.

The report was commissioned by the government and recommended, among other things, purchase of the escarpment lands and a crackdown on stone quarries operating on or near the escarpment.

CLOSED PITS

The quarry crackdown, begun early last fall, had forced some operators to close their pits until they were

cleaned up, but the government has been granting most operators monthly permits to keep going.
