Lumber Firm Employee Here And in Milton

A Ballinafad native and former Georgetown resident, William Henry Cole died in Milton hospital on March 17. He was 77.

Son of Levi and Sarah Collier Cole, he attended Blue Mountain school, and following his marriage in 1920 to Bessie Swindlehurst they farmed on the family farm for four years.

Moving to Georgetown, he worked at the Bessey Feed Mill, then joined his brother-in-law, Howard Kentner, as an employee of the Georgetown Lumber Company. In 1940 he moved to Milton and worked at the Milton Lumber Company which Mr. Kentner had acquired.

He was a member of the United Church.

ESQUESING COUNCIL BRIEFS

Esquesing employees with 25 years or more service will be entitled to five weeks vacation with pay, according to a motion passed Monday night at Esquesing council.

- Approved the payment of \$1,097 to IBM for tax billing.

STORE CLOSING BY-LAW 71-31

The Corporation of the Town of Georgetown

BY-LAW NO. 71-31

A By-law to provide for the early closing of shops in the Town of Georgetown.

WHEREAS By-law No. 71-10 was enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown to provide for the early closing of certain classes of shops;

AND WHEREAS Council now deems it expedient and necessary to make certain changes in the provisions aforesaid and to that end have decided to repeal said By-Law No. 71-10;

AND WHEREAS by virtue of Section 379a of The Municipal Act, R.S.O. 1960, Chapter 249, as amended, the Council of a municipality may provide for the early closing of all or any class or classes of shops within the municipality;

AND WHEREAS Council considers it desirable that a new by-law be passed requiring certain classes of shops within the Town of Georgetown to close and remain closed as hereinafter provided;

AND WHEREAS it is the declared intention of Council that any section or part of a section of this by-law which may subsequently be held to be illegal shall be severable from the remainder of the by-law and shall not be deemed to have repealed or influenced the Council to pass the remainder of the by-law;

NOW, THEREFORE, THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

1. The provisions of this by-law shall not apply to the following classes of shops:

- (a) Garages & Service Stations
- (b) Restaurants
- (c) Coal and Lumber Dealers
- (d) Drug Stores
- (e) Confectionery Shops and Delicatessens
- (f) Implement Dealers
- (g) Automobile Retail and Service Centres
- (h) Barber Shops and Beauty Parlours
- (i) Milk Stores

2. For the purposes of this

by-law the words 'closed' and 'shop' shall have the same meaning as those words bear in Section 379a of The Municipal Act, R.S.O. 1960, Chapter 249, as amended;

3. For the purposes of this by-law the word 'holiday' means and the word 'holidays' includes:

- (a) Sunday
- (b) New Year's Day
- (c) Good Friday
- (d) Victoria Day
- (e) Dominion Day
- (f) The first Monday in the month of August
- (g) Labour Day
- (h) Christmas Day
- (i) Any day appointed by the proclamation of the Governor General of Canada or the Lieutenant Governor of the Province of Ontario as a public holiday for the Province of Ontario.

4. Every shop as defined by section 379a(1) (b) of The Municipal Act, R.S.O. 1960, Chapter 249 as amended, subject to paragraph one, in the Town of Georgetown shall be and remain closed on Mondays, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays from 9:00 o'clock in the afternoon to 5:00 o'clock in the forenoon of the next following day and on Saturdays from 8:00 o'clock in the afternoon to 5:00 o'clock in

the forenoon of the next following Monday.

5. Subject to Paragraph One of this By-law, all shops shall be closed on holidays.

6. So long as the time commonly observed in the Town of Georgetown is one hour in advance of standard time, the times mentioned in this by-law shall be reckoned in accordance with the time so commonly observed and not in accordance with standard time.

7. Any person convicted of a breach of any provisions of this by-law shall be liable to a fine of not more than Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars, exclusive of costs, for each offence and in default of payment, to imprisonment for a term of not more than one year.

8. Upon this by-law coming into force, By-laws No. 71-13 and 71-28 be and they are hereby repealed in their entirety.

9. This by-law comes into force and effect on the 5th day of April, 1971, and the Clerk of The Corporation of the Town of Georgetown shall cause a copy hereof to be published, before the said date, in the Georgetown Herald, a newspaper having general circulation in the Town of Georgetown.
