

War on Halton Lamprey In Government's Plan

The Honourable James Snow, Minister without Portfolio and MPP for Halton East, announced this week a new lamprey control treatment program to be carried out in Halton County streams by the Ontario Department of Lands and Forests.

Streams to be treated include: Bronte Creek, Oakville Creek, and Credit River. Adult lamprey may appear in some of the other rivers but do not spawn in them.

LAMPREY CONTROL

Lamprey control programs in the Great Lakes are co-ordinated by the Great Lakes Fishery Commission under an international convention ratified in 1956. The commission and its advisors consists of representatives from the federal governments of the United States and Canada, the States of New York, Pennsylvania, Ohlo, Michigan, Indiana , Illinois, Wisconsin, and Minnesota and the Province of Ontario.

In Ontario, lamprey control is carried out by the sea lamprey control unit of the Federal Department of Fisheries and Forestry at Sault Ste. Marie.
