Inspected Handcrafts Overseas Teacher Talks to Arts, Crafts

The March meeting of the Arts and Crafts of Georgetown was held Thursday, the 18th, at the home of the president Mrs. T. E. Beer, R. R. 3, Georgetown. The beautiful spring day ensured a large attendance.

The president reported that the annual exhibition and sale is planned for October 16, and that the Arts and Crafts will co-operate with Sheridan College in the survey being conducted on community arts and crafts in Halton and Peel counties.

Mrs. John Agg, program convener, announced that she is making arrangements for a June bus trip to the Albright Knox Art Gallery in Buffalo.

Mrs. W. J. Beatty, craft convener, gave her report on the success of the current courses in Gold and Silver Wire Jewelry and in Silverwork, and informed the members that the course in Advanced Glass will be given in April.

Mrs. Agg introduced the guest speaker — Miss Patricia Gray, A.O.C.A., a recent graduate from the Material Arts Course of the Ontario College of Art. Miss Gray spins, weaves, dyes her fibres with natural materials, and produces

suiting tweeds, wall hangings, and ballet costumes. For two years she demonstrated the craft of spinning at Black Creek Pioneer Village and last October was one of the demonstrators at the annual exhibition of the Arts and Crafts of Georgetown. Miss Gray has shown her weaving at the Aggregation Gallery in Toronto and is currently teaching pioneer crafts in Toronto and for the Etobicoke School Board.

In the spring and summer of 1970, Miss Gray spent nineteen weeks travelling through Northern Europe, Scandinavia, and Britain to inspect handcrafts, with special emphasis on textiles. Her summer ended with attendance at the Fourth Biennial Conference of The World Crafts' Council in Dublin. Miss Gray used her own colour slides to illustrate her very interesting talk about the artists she visited and the crafts she observed during that memorable trip.
