



### Third Time Winner of Public Speaking Trophy

Stewarttown public school pupil Michele Mumby of R. R. 1, Georgetown is a three time winner of the R. J. Cunningham Trophy for public speaking. She won it in 1968 and 1969 as a Limehouse public school pupil and this time captured it and the North Halton Education Area honours, as a senior scholar at Stewarttown.

Earlier this year she won the Stewarttown school contest and the Esqueving Women's Institute Shield which goes with it. Michele competed in the Halton County finals in Oakville and represented the school and North Halton Education Area well though not a winner. Her topic — "Hippies."

### Cut Route to 25 Miles For This Year's Oxfam

Oxfam Miles for Millions — Millions of blisters, sore muscles, glad hearts and dollars for Oxfam.

This year the big day is Saturday, May 1st, and there will be a few changes in the form of the walk.

The route has been cut to 25 miles so that, hopefully, most walkers can finish in daylight.

It will avoid main roads as much as possible to make it safer for the hikers and to avoid blocking traffic.

The starting and finishing points will be at the fairgrounds in Brampton with several checkpoints along the way.

Where do Oxfam dollars go? The greatest proportion goes into development work in an effort to alleviate the effects of erratic rainfall, poor soil and harsh climates. Oxfam maintains 12 field stations throughout the world like fire brigades ready to send help to any area of need. Two per cent of the field budget maintains those stations and 98% is spent on actual projects, such as improving medical facilities, agricultural development and training.

Money is available for em-

ergencies \$60,000 for earthquake relief in Peru, relief for earthquake victims in Turkey and food for Palestinian refugees in Jordan and Gaza.

Oxfam's purpose is summed up best by a phrase used by the U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization "Give a man a fish and you feed him for a day; teach him to fish and feed him for a lifetime."

### OTHER DROP THREE TO FIVE MILLS

## Old R.C. School Bd. Deficit Makes Tax Reduction Slight

Separate school taxes will drop in Halton County in 1971 despite an estimated spending increase of \$528,998.

Increases are mainly in the areas of plant operation, cost of new schools and additions and debt service charges.

The board, whose mill rates rose above public school rates for the first time last year, had a surplus of \$100,000 in 1970.

#### RESERVE FUND

Finance committee chairman Michael Noonan said that the separate school board will maintain a reserve fund in case it has difficulty matching public school mill rates next year.

The estimated cost per pupil rose \$75 from \$442 in 1970 to \$517 in 1971. The provincial government guideline is \$545 per pupil.

Mill rates for separate school ratepayers are down three to five mills in each municipality except Georgetown and Nassagaweya.

Although Nassagaweya's mill rate rose .18 from 21.82 in 1970 to an estimated 22 in 1971, its separate school rate is lower than that of the public school board which is 24.48.

**GEORGETOWN AREA**

Georgetown's mill rate dropped only 1.9 mills to 19.85 for residential and 2.43 mills to 21.62 for commercial.

Noonan attributed the lower mill rate drop in Georgetown to the deficit held by the Georgetown school board before the 1969 formation of county boards.

The provincial government will pick up the deficit through grants but interest on the deficit must be paid at the local level by Georgetown separate school supporters.

Total proposed board expenditure for 1971 is \$4,831,600, up \$528,998 from the 1970 budget of \$4,302,602.

The \$4,831,600 spending ap-

proved by the board will be offset by an estimated grant of \$4,014,166 in revenue from provincial grants.

#### MUNICIPAL LEVIES

Of the balance of \$817,434, 16.67 per cent or \$805,434 will come from municipal levies and \$12,000 from other revenue sources.

Although salary negotiations have not yet begun with separate school teachers, instruction costs account for the major portion of the 1971 budget estimates.

Estimated teacher and principal salaries amount to \$2,454,

456 up from \$2,258,583 in 1970. Total instruction costs will take 62.55 per cent or \$3,022,403 of the entire budget.

**ASSESSMENT UP**

Assessment rose in every Halton municipality but the actual rate of increase of assess-

ment declined, in Burlington by as much as 50 per cent.

Board chairman Leno Braida said the decrease might be attributed to last year's separate school mill rate being higher than public school mill rates. Neither he nor Noonan could
