They will also carry a letter from Mayor Smith to the mayor of Vancouver thanking that city for hosting the local teams. Mayor Smith told the teams, both of whom are Southern Ontario champions that very few people from here have earned the honour of competing for a Canadian title and the town is proud of them.

The Bantam age range is 12 and under. Also competing in the National Youth Bowling Council championships will be juniors, 13 to 15 years of age, and seniors 16 to 20.

In all 258 youngsters from across Canada will be hunting for Canadian titles while the majority of youngsters in the rest of the country are hunting for Easter eggs.

The bowling starts April 11 continuing through 12 and 13.
