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Dundas Intermediate A hockey club which eliminated Georgetown Raiders from the Niagara Peninsula Intermediate A Hockey League playoffs have been bounced four games to one in the final series with Brantford.

Brantford snapped the one-one tie in games Friday night when they won 3-2 in Brantford. Sunday, in Dundas they won 3-1, and the best of seven series ended Monday night in Brantford with a 5-1 victory.

Brantford now enter the Ontario Intermediate A final against Midland. The first game of that series was in Midland last night, with game two slated for Brantford Arena tomorrow night.
