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## Retired Anglican Rector 'Fills In' at St. George's

With the ministry of St. George's Anglican Church vacant until a successor to Rev. Eric Mills is appointed a Georgetown resident will be filling in.

Rev. L. V. Pocock is taking services and looking after the needs of the parish during the vacancy.

Mr. and Mrs. Pocock moved here from Cayuga last September and live at 59 Norton Crescent. They chose Georgetown for their retirement to be near one of their 7 children Mrs. Tony Gordon, 134 Rexway Drive.

During his 47 years in the ministry, Mr. Pocock has served several Ontario parishes. He was first at Blyth, Belgrave and Auburn, then Florence and Bothwell and for eleven years at Hespeler and Ayr.

He was minister of St. David's, London, at Ingersoll and at St. Aidan's, Windsor when he officially retired. Then for two years he served as rector at Cayuga.

A Wycliffe College graduate, he took further studies for his

Bachelor of Divinity degree at Huron College, London.

Mr. Mills has now assumed his new duties at St. John the Evangelist in Hamilton after a four year stay in Georgetown.

On the Sunday prior to his departure, church members held a reception and buffet luncheon in the parish hall following the morning service.

People's warden William McNally presented a purse to Mr. Mills and silver candelabra to Mr. and Mrs. Mills as a parting gift. Their daughters, Angela and Rosemary were given charm bracelets. There were presentations made also from the Anglican Church Women, Daughters of the Church and Cub and Scout Group.

## Chinguacousy Nixes Deer Hunt Seasons

No deer hunting in Chinguacousy Township. That was the verdict after township council hashed out the pros and cons of a three-day deer hunting season for next fall.

While the deer may be safe, the partridge, rabbits, pheasant and foxes had better be on the look-out as there is nothing to stop the hunters from chasing them. Even at that they might stand a better chance this fall as the council recommended that non-resident licenses be limited to a total of 100, half the number issued last year.

Councillor George Gardhouse presented a resolution calling for a by-law to prohibit hunting of any kind within the township. Mr. Gardhouse said he was interested in the safety of township residents and was worried about hunters who create a nuisance for landowners. He said the prohibition would not stop farmers from destroying pests.

Township Reeve Robert Williams, a veterinarian by profession, urged that the township adopt a deer hunting season and one covering other game including foxes.
