**Prominent Halton County Men Now Liberal Life Members**

Three residents of Halton for most of their life were honoured by local Liberals at the annual meeting of Halton-West and Halton-Wentworth Liberal Association at Burlington.

Former publisher Elgin Harris, former MP Hughes Cleaver and former Paul Fisher received life memberships in both federal and provincial Liberal associations.

Mrs. G. Foote, Burlington councillor, introduced the guests of honour and made the presentations. Due to illness Mr. Harris was unable to attend the celebrations but was honoured along with the other gentlemen.

"I feel greatly honoured and very humble standing before three great gentlemen who have taken a very prominent part in shunting Burlington from its stark pioneering mode of life on to a more progressive track of civilized society," announced Mrs. Foote. "This was a time when there were no pension cheques, no family allowances, no crop subsidies or other cushions to ease the rough edges of existences. Their sole resources of wealth were hard work, business ability, the soil and the knowhow to mould them together to produce revenue to provide for their families," she noted.

Elgin Harris, 95 and oldest of the three was born in Seneca Township, Halldam County in 1876. His family moved to Caledonia when he was a year old and their home was across from the Grand River Schem. "His proximity to a newspaper may have influenced his life," continued Mrs. Foote.

Mr. Harris was a carrier boy for the Schem and in 1890 began to learn about the newspaper trade in earnest. He worked for the Petrolia and several other papers before purchasing the Burlington Gazette in 1899.

He carried on the newspaper business until he was 80 and retired in 1956, when he sold his newspaper.

"He has always taken a keen interest in town affairs" added Mrs. Foote. He is the oldest living Warden in Halton County. In 1901 and 1922 he was Reeve and on Jan. 1, 1923 he had the unique distinction of being Reeve, Warden of Halton County and Mayor-elect of Burlington. He was mayor in 1923 and 1924.

Mr. Harris was a member of the Water Commission and the School Board and in 1902 joined the Canadian Press Association. He is an honorary member of the Ontario Quebec Newspaper Association. "Actually many of the town's advances were spearheaded by the editor of the local paper, who had a great deal of power in influencing

public opinion," Mrs. Foote concluded.

"On the other hand Paul Fisher was born in a shady cottage on the Guelph Line," she said.

Paul Fisher's grandmother was Sarah Allen and his father was Franklin Webster Fisher, an unsuccessful candidate in the federal and provincial elections of 1917.

During Mr. Fisher's term as president of the Halton Liberal Association he travelled to Ottawa to request grants for projects for Burlington and especially the Horticultural Society. He also led a delegation to Ottawa to the convention that chose Mackenzie King's successor.

Mr. Fisher succeeded Allan Nicholson as chairman of the Inter-Urban Water Board, a post he held for 10 years and was instrumental in obtaining better facilities for the town. Mr. Fisher was also successful in preventing Lowville Park from falling into the hands of private owners.

Mr. Fisher was an active member in the St. John Ambulance Corps during World War I. Elies Hughes Cleaver, the third noted man to receive a life membership in the Liberal association, was born in Burlington in 1892. He received his public school education in town then later at the University of Toronto and finally he graduated from Osgoode Hall with a L.L.B. He married Ariel Shephard and raised three daughters.


Mr. Cleaver served in the army during the first war and had already had a taste of political life at that time, having been elected as a Burlington councillor. On his return from overseas he ran for Reeve and was elected and after two years as Reeve he ran for mayor and won.

Hughes Cleaver fought and won four elections and represented Halton in Ottawa from 1935 to 1953 when he retired. He was chairman of the Bank Committee for 10 years, the War Expenditures Committee for two years and the government owned Railways Committee for five years.

"I am sure these three men have gone far beyond the calls of duty on many occasions to render assistance to our community and our country as a whole," added Mrs. Foote. "Now in this era of astronauts, satellites, coloured televisions, go trains, rapid transit systems and computers, they are as keenly interested in all this as persons who are 50 years their juniors," she concluded.
