Drags Critic Will Sit In On Ratepayers-Dragway Meet

Reeve Tom Hill lost his cool, Wednesday night, when Peter Bowman, neighbour to the Golden Horseshoe Dragway, asked if he could attend the committee meeting where both the Esqueuing Ratepayers Association and the Golden Horseshoe Dragway owners will be present.

"No you can't," the reeve retorted. "I already asked you if you wanted to talk to council and you said you didn't."

ASK FOR SAME

"Then I can write a letter asking for such a meeting the same as they did," stated Bowman.

Cr. Dick Howitt felt Bowman should be allowed to attend as the most directly concerned, "and perhaps the most knowledgeable about the dragstrip."

SITTING BACK

"Why should he, when I already asked him if he wanted to speak?" the reeve shot back. "I don't like people sitting back, waiting for somebody else to do something, before he makes his move."

"At that time he didn't know about the proposed meeting" replied Howitt, "I just want to be fair to everyone."

SAVE TIME

Cr. Len Cox pointed out it would save the council's time to have him at the same meeting, rather than having another one.

Reeve Tom Hill finally said he would go along with having Bowman at the committee meeting, but promised "I'm not going to fool around with you this year, like we did last year, taking up so much time."

Trustee Will Survey Parents On Norval School Closing

Helton Board of Education trustee Bill Lawson will personally conduct a survey of the parents of the 82 students in Grades 1-8 at Norval school to see if they want to keep the school or abandon it and send their children to a larger school in Georgetown.

The Esqueuing trustee said Thursday night the proposed closing of the three room Norval school - which administrators say has inadequate facilities - is likely to be discussed by the board of education within six weeks.

In a presentation to the board April 8, a group of ratepayers from Norval refuted the administration reasons for recommending the closing of the 18 year old school at the end of next year. They suggested it be expanded, with the return of the kindergarten students and the addition of other new students from surrounding areas.

Lawson said the chances of the board expanding the school were just about nil. He noted the old Esqueuing Township School Board on two different occasions turned down similar requests.

The survey proposed by Lawson would offer the Norval parents two basic choices: to keep the school open without expansion, or close it as planned and bus the children to Georgetown.

Lawson said the first choice would be just postponing the inevitable, but said that if it is the parents clear choice he will certainly see that the other board members know it before they decide.
