

# Georgetown Doctor Gets Flying Scholarship As Pilot-of-Year

A Georgetown doctor has been honoured as Pilot of the Year by the Brampton Flying Club. Dr. Alex Ashenhurst was presented with a shield and a \$50 advanced flying scholarship before an assembly of 132 members and guests at the Georgetown Golf Club.

The occasion was the 23rd annual Wings Parade — a dinner, dance, and awards night for the 228 member flying club.

## RELOCATION

The past fiscal year saw the official opening of the flying club's new airfield and facilities near the village of Victoria, six miles north of Brampton in Chinguacousy Township.

The club had conducted flying activities since the 1940's from a field just south of Brampton until recent air traffic control changes at Toronto International Airport made the relocation necessary.

## McVEAN TOO

Also honoured at the Wings Parade was radio personality Bill McVean of CFRB. McVean a pilot since 1938 and a private aircraft owner, is well-known as the official CNE Airshow commentator and long a supporter of Canadian general aviation on his radio programs.

Incoming Brampton flying club president Blaine Bowyer presented McVean with an honorary membership in the club for his service to general aviation and with particular thanks for his service last October 18 when McVean acted as commentator for the Club's airshow when the new airfield was officially opened. More than five thousand persons saw an exciting aerial display and inspected moored aircraft of all types.

## EVEN BETTER

The new club president announced that Bill McVean has agreed to give the airshow commentary again this year — September 12, 1971 — when the club has scheduled an even better aerial and static display as part of the 150th anniversary celebrations of Chinguacousy Township. The airshow co-sponsored by the township, should

highlight the potential contribution the flying club can make to its new home community.

The assembled club members gave special thanks and honour to outgoing president Don Fisher for service to the club and to general aviation above and beyond the call of duty. Fisher served four years continuously as president, guiding the club through the hardships of relocation.

The central event of the annual Wings Parade was the presentation of private pilot's wings to the members who have completed ground school training and flight training in the 12 month period ending December 31. Sixteen wings were presented this year.

Dr. Ashenhurst received the Pilot of the Year award as well as his wings for earning the top combined score on the Ministry of Transport written examination and flight test. He is now eligible for the Royal Canadian Flying Club's Association national top pilot award — the Governor General's Shield and a \$400 advanced flying training scholarship.

The visit to the older girl's residence was interesting and all gained an insight into the terrible handicap of deafness. The school, on a 99 acre site, is owned by the Ontario government and is free. The students ages range from 5 to about 20 with many of them residents at the school.

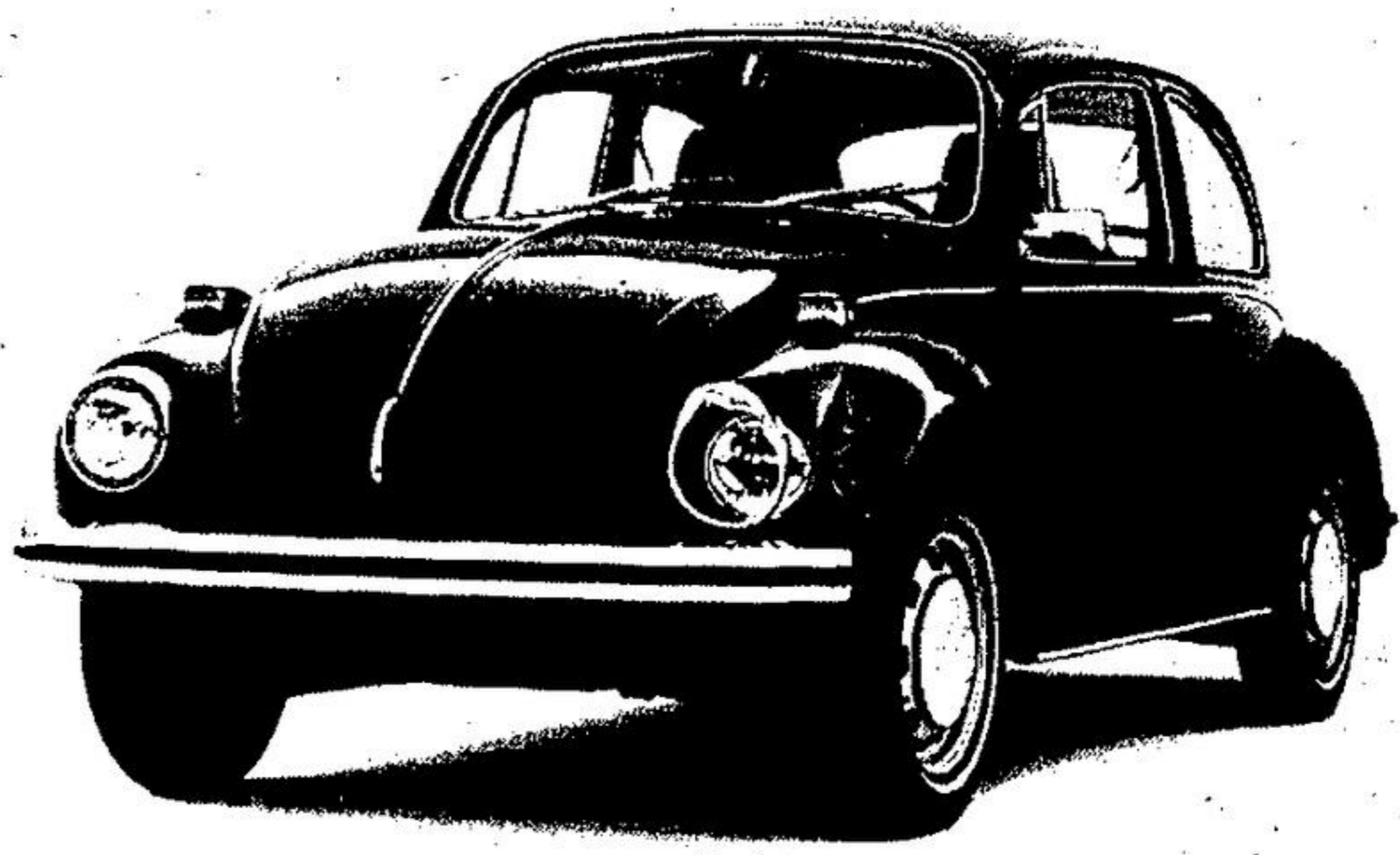
