


· Council decided to bring the number of members on the Industrial Commission up to 10 from the present six. This was recommended by the Department of Trade and Develop-

• The Liquor Control Board of Ontario have asked for a meeting with council to discuss another liquor outlet in town.

 Council approved a motion to reduce the term of a \$261,000 debenture to Ontario Municipal Improvement Corporation from 20 years to 10 years. The payments will be upped to \$10,000 a year, but interest amounting to \$146,422 will be saved over the length of the debenture.
