**Scrapes and Cuts to Driver, Cycle Rider**

A single car accident, April 14, at the junction of the 7th Line and No. 7 Highway, caused \$800 damage to a 1971 Datsun, driven by Dana Hann of Guelph.

Another single car accident the following day, injured Susan Searsbrick of Hamilton, slightly, and caused \$400 damage to her 1970 Volkswagen.

The accident occurred on the Esqueving - Nassagaweya town line, north of the base line.

**CLIPS OFF POLE**

April 17, a hydro pole was clipped off on the 1st line, one mile north of 5 Sideroad, when an International dump truck hit it. The truck driven by Janice Kirsten of Willowdale only received \$15 damage, but damage to the hydro pole will cost \$200.

Mrs. Donna Lee Brown, and two year old daughter Heather Lynn, of R. R. 1, Limehouse, were taken to Georgetown District Hospital, suffering from cuts to the face and legs, as a result of a single car accident on the 5th Line, south of Highway 7.

The April 18 accident caused \$1,500 damage to the 1963 Falcon, Mrs. Brown was driving. \$1,100 damage was the total when a 1962 Rambler, driven by Donald Lalonde, R. R. 3, Milton and a '69 Pontiac driven by Frederick Gordon, R. R. 2, Acton, collided at the corner of 25 Highway and 5 Sideroad, April 18.

**CUTS AND ABRASIONS**

George R. Green, R. R. 2, Georgetown, was admitted to Georgetown hospital with cuts and abrasions to his face, as a result of a motorcycle accident. No damage was done to his '70 Kawasaki, when he lost control of it at 5 Sideroad, just west of the 7th Line.

**GEORGETOWN COUNCIL BRIEFS**

• Mayor Bill Smith told council Monday he has plans for another 'Beautification Day', sometime in May, and hopes to use service clubs and the Concerned Citizens of Georgetown. He appointed a committee of Cns. Siddall, Denison, Sykes and himself to organize the day.

• Council decided to bring the number of members on the Industrial Commission up to 10 from the present six. This was recommended by the Department of Trade and Development.

• Dogs running at large will cost their owners more. It will be \$7 for the first offence, \$10 for the second and \$25 for the third. In addition \$2 a day must be paid for its board. The dog will be kept a maximum of three days.

• The Liquor Control Board of Ontario have asked for a meeting with council to discuss another liquor outlet in town.

• Council approved a motion to reduce the term of a \$281,000 debenture to Ontario Municipal Improvement Corporation from 20 years to 10 years. The payments will be upped to \$10,000 a year, but interest amounting to \$146,422 will be saved over the length of the debenture.

• They also officially established the position of clerk-administrator, and created a new position of chief accountant.



**NORTH HALTON REPORT**

During the week ending April 10, officers of the Ontario Provincial Police stationed at North Halton Detachment worked 8,109 miles on area roads under their jurisdiction. Charges were laid against 64 motorists for infractions of the Highway Traffic Act; while 44 others were warned regarding their driving habits. Proceedings in Provincial Court held in Milton resulted in 31 convictions being registered. Officers investigated 21 gen-

eral occurrences during the week included 2 thefts, 1 of which involved a motor vehicle 2 missing person complaints, 2 complaints of mischief, 1 stolen car was recovered, 1 domestic complaint, 2 investigations under the Liquor Control Act which resulted in charges being laid against 2 persons and 1 impaired driver was apprehended. Other occurrences were of a minor nature and required little time to clear.

**SECOND FATALITY**

North Halton Detachment recorded its second fatality of the year, when an Oshawa man died as a result of injuries received in a collision which occurred on the 401 Highway. Two other persons also sustained injuries in this collision. Personal injuries were also sustained by 10 persons in 4 additional accidents; while property damage resulted in the remaining 5 investigated during the week. Total property damage was estimated to be approximately \$9,435.

The accidents were attributed to — careless driving, improper turns, improper passing, and improper lane change. One accident occurred when a deer ran out onto the roadway. To date 4 charges have been laid

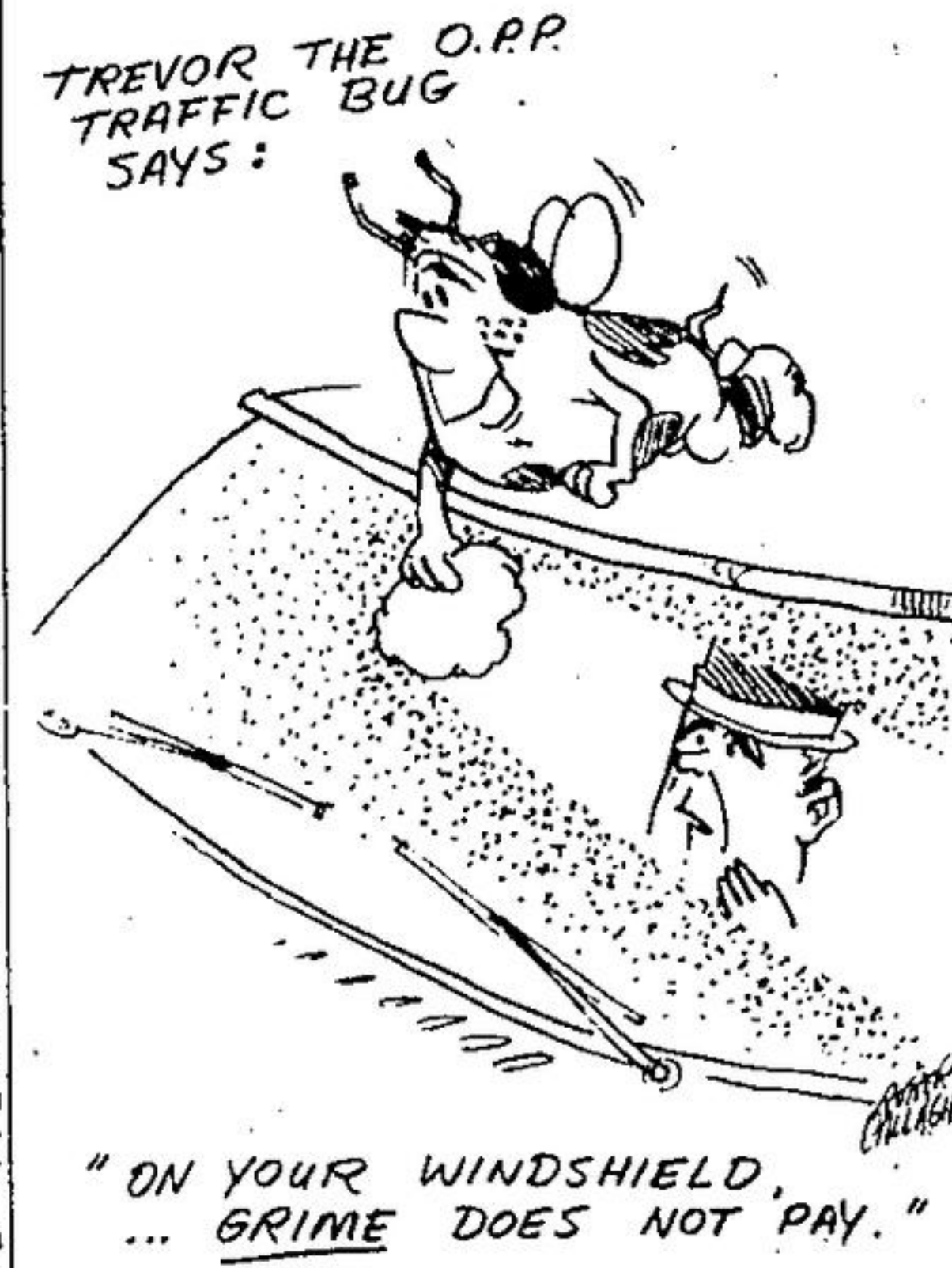
and others are pending. Advice from the back seat, if it arouses resentment, is more likely to cause an accident than to prevent one. Every passenger in a car has a responsibility to the driver to see that his own behaviour does not contribute to unnecessary distraction or tension.

**TRI COUNTY MEETING**

A delegation of nine Georgetown hockey men are expected to attend the Tri-County Minor Hockey Association's annual meeting in Milton Legion Sunday afternoon. A new regulation requires that each town send a representation equal to the number of teams in the league plus their regular delegate. Georgetown has five A teams and three B teams in Tri-County hockey. There is a \$5 fine for each delegate not in attendance.

One proposal would make it necessary for all referees doing Midget and Juvenile games next season to be appointed.

Another would have the AAA organizations in Burlington, Guelph, Oakville and Brampton use first year players only on their second string teams.



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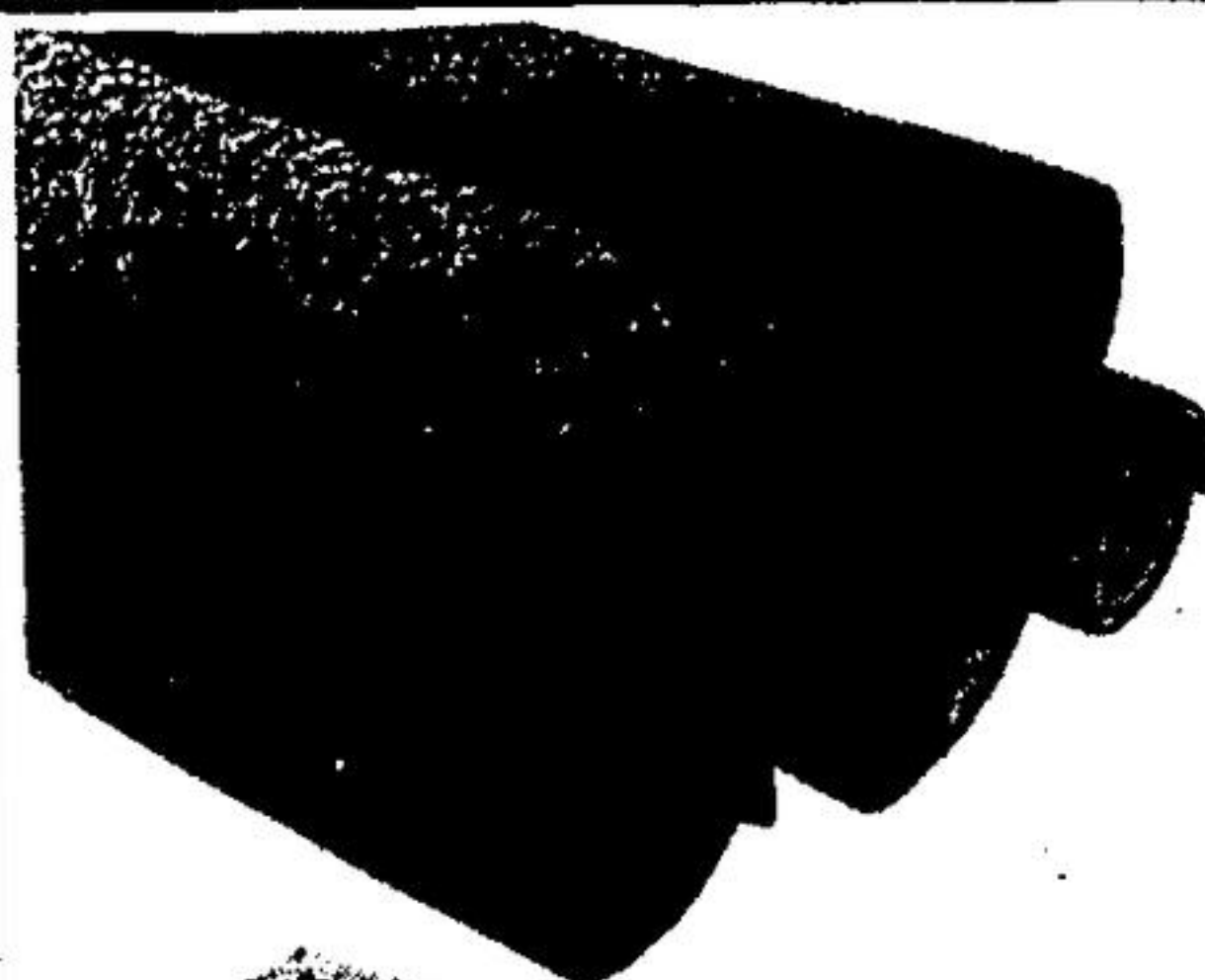
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
