

# Jubilant Juniors Averaged 221 Taking National 5 Pin Honours

Southern Ontario won first place in the aggregate standings at this year's National Youth Bowling Council Championships in Vancouver B.C. last week.

Southern Ontario had 2,778 points compared with Northern Ontario's 2,684 and 2,679 for Manitoba.

British Columbia placed fourth with 2,652; Alberta had 2,625; Saskatchewan 2,524 and Newfoundland 2,444.

Southern Ontario won five out of twelve events, and placed first, second or third, in all but three events.

But the big talk of our town is the Canadian championship brought home by Georgetown's junior boys team. The team, made up of David Warman, Stephen Foster, Steven Burns,

Rick Gourlie and Chris Burke collected 414 Peterson points, 15 points up on the second place from Manitoba, and 40 points ahead of the third place British Columbia team who had 374 points.

Our boys had a total 18 game pin-fall of 19,932 — an average of 221, per player, per game. They won 16 of their 18 games. Their highest single team games were 1,289 and 1,287.

Georgetown's Bantam girls, also representing Southern Ontario, put up a tremendous battle. The team of Nancy Nurse, Sylvia Heissler, Diane Marshall, Diana Bratkin and Sherry Everett brought home the third place bronze medal.

They collected 306 Peterson points, only 3 points down from second place Manitoba and 11 down from Northern Ontario with a total of 317 points.

The Northern Ontario girls from Azilda tossed a 15,219 total pinfall. Our girls rolled 14,

865 and had a 9-9 win, lose record.

All ten girls and boys on the team agree, it couldn't have been done without the marvelous coaching given by Joan and George Archibald. A special thanks from the team members, and congratulations from all Georgetown is forwarded to them.

Alberta's Kevin Strelt of Steller, won the bantam boys singles with 88 points; 2 points ahead of Grant Dowdy from Revelstoke, B.C., and 3 ahead of Paul Miller from Manitoba.

His brother, Kim Strelt placed first in the junior boys singles with 98 points. They are from 'Family Recreation' in Steller, Alberta.

The southern Ontario team from Rexdale won the bantam boys team division with 350 points to Alberta's 330.

Bantam girl Anita Tasca of Toronto had 91 points, to defeat Cathy Morgan of Rich-

mond, British Columbia by 8 points.

Leslie Warrington of Burnaby British Columbia won the junior girls crown. Her runner-up was Theresa Maloney of Toronto. They had 95 and 92 points respectively.

The junior girls team crown was taken by a Northern Ontario entry from Sudbury. They had 395 points.

British Columbia's Harold Porter of Cranbrook just edged out Jan Anderson of Red Deer Alberta. Both ended up with 98 points but Anderson's carry over pin total was 16 pins lower than Porter's.

Brenda Crump of London, Ont. was running away with senior girls title, but then Heather Parront of Burnaby, B.C. made a race of it and ended up only two points down from her at 98. That was rather close.

A Northern Ontario team from Thunder Bay won the senior boys team event with 436 points.

The team from Hamilton placed second with 424 points.

Another team from Hamilton a senior girls team atop the rest with 391 points, just edging out a team from Vancouver by one point.

The high game of the tourney was a 384, rolled by a member of Georgetown's junior boys team, Chris Burke. He rolled 8 consecutive strikes; picked a headpin in the ninth frame, counting twelve, and finished in the tenth frame with 3 more strikes.

Senior girl Brenda Crump of London, Ontario was consistent. In one game she tossed a 365 single, but didn't lose her touch in the next game as she threw a 363.

At presentation banquet, all first, second and third placers were presented with gold, silver or bronze medals, and the National champions were presented with a banner stating their achievement.
