GEORGETOWN AT TRI-COUNTY

Get Mileage Chart, Wanted Scorer Cup Nixed, More Refs

Two Georgetown proposals were voted down in close votes and a third was accepted at the Tri-County Minor Hockey Association's annual meeting Sunday.

The proposal to draw up an official mileage chart listing the distances between all 11 towns in the league be drawn up and sent to towns along with the list of referees found favor with the delegates.

Georgetown Minor Hockey Support Group president Del Beaumont explained such a chart was needed to eliminate the confusion that exists now. He said some referees may list their round trip from Milton for instance as 14 miles while another might put it down as 20. "This is just to establish some uniformity and prevent some

officials from overcharging when getting their expenses," Beaumont said.

TEAM PLAY

One of Georgetown's defeated proposals would have abolished the trophies presented to leading scorers in each age group. "Too much emphasis has been placed on the individual player and not enough on team play," said Beaumont in support of the proposal. "A lot of times the top scorer honours is all that some players think about. They put it ahead of everything, but that's not the way it should be in minor hockey. Some boys' play good hockey but never get recognized," he said.

The other Georgetown proposal, to have one referee and two linemen used in all OMHA

Midget and Juvenile playoff games instead of the present two referee system, was suggested as a way to reduce the rough play.

Increase \$16.40 American Motors

Members of the American Motors Unit of Local 1285, United Auto Workers, voted 81 per cent in favour of accepting a new three year contract Sunday.

Of the 1,100 members of the unit, only 413 cast votes in a secret ballot at the ratification meeting held in the Centennial Secondary School in Brampton.

Local president, Jim Peters, described the agreement as being "an excellent one, considering we are dealing with one of the smaller auto companies."

GETTING MORE

The members of the local, he said "are getting more than the big three (Ford, Chrysler and General Motors) workers. We were a little behind in our efforts to get parity in our last two contracts because they were one year terms. The new contract will put us ahead at its termination."

The new contract calls for an immediate average increase of \$16.40 per 40 hour week for the production workers.

Effective immediately, workers will receive a 10 cent an hour increase retroactive to March 1 and an 11 cent an hour increase retroactive to Oct. 16, 1970, when the old contract expired.

LUMP SUM

By the end of the new contract, a labourer will receive \$4.32 an hour. He is presently paid \$3.47 an hour. An electrical technician now getting \$4.81 an hour will get \$5.89.

The company will make a lump sum payment of \$8,000 into the supplementary unemployment benefit (SUB) fund and increase its hourly payment into the fund to 10 cents a working hour. At present time the rate is seven cents a working hour into the fund used to supplement a workers income during a layoff.

Fourth Year For Beaumont Support Prexy

Del Beaumont was named to a fourth year as president of the Georgetown Minor Hockey Support Group at a meeting on Monday at Cedarvale Community Centre.

There are also 15 members of the executive committee on the slate of officers.
